Busses Run As Usual In Six Cities

11th-Hour Truce Averts Walkout

Impressive indications piled up rapidly in official quarters here today that the threatened six-city strike of Duke Power Co. bus drivers will be deferred at least 60 days.

The buses operated normally in Charlotte and five other Carolina cities today after a last-minute truce was agreed to by the power company and Brotherhood Railway Trainmen.

The BRT leaders accepted with several conditions. The effect of their acceptance was to assure a truce for probably ten days. This condition was insisted upon by BRT leaders to allow them time to call meetings for the purpose of electing new members to replace or reject the plan.

Most important in its immediate effect among the proposals by Mayor Shaw was the suggestion that the long-drawn-out dispute over wages and other BRT demands should be referred to an impartial three-member fact-finding committee.
