There are several things about Senator Frank Graham which have removed themselves from the area of contention in this campaign simply because they are admitted by everyone who knows him. Some of them:

1. His intelligence and learning.
2. His Christian character.
3. His strength of conviction, and courage to fight for what he believes in.
4. His devotion to America, and his firm belief that the average man is the hard core of democracy and can be trusted to do the right thing.

But Graham's critics will undoubtedly center their fire in this campaign, as they have done in years past on two major characteristics which they consider vulnerable:

1. His affinity for the "liberal" side of most state and national issues which divide the people into "liberal" or "conservative" groups. His enemies contend that he is too far to the left of the people of North Carolina, hence does not represent "Red" views.
2. His implicit trust in his fellow man, and his faith in "good" causes and officials.

Other 'Poor Risks' Named By Senator

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) charged today that the State Department gave a high post to a former Spanish republican army officer, Gustavo Duran, although U. S. Army reports labeled him a Russian agent.

Continuing to detail to a Senate investigating committee his contention that the department has employed poor security risks, McCarthy also said that:

Dr. Harlow Shapley, American delegate to a United Nations commission, has been employed with at least 38 Communist-front organizations.
