Carolina Festival Is Reorganized

Plans for a gay and exciting three-day festival, somewhat similar to the New Orleans Mardi Gras, were discussed by the directors of the Carolinas Festival Committee at a meeting this morning at the Chamber of Commerce.

Officers elected
New officers for the festival organization elected at the meeting were: Earl Crawford, president; Donk Plintton, vice-president; Charles Dudley, secretary; and John Watlington, treasurer.

A committee was appointed by President Love to choose a name for the new festival, including Mrs. Kath P. Halburton of The Charlotte Observer, the Rev. Dr. Warren Hall and Mrs. Catherine Hall.

The new president also appointed a plans committee to coordinate all activities and entertainment for the three-day gala festival. This committee includes: Mrs. Kath P. Halburton, chairman; Earl Crawford and Charles Dudley, members.

When a suggested plan for the festival has been developed within the next two or three weeks, a large dinner meeting will be held at which 150 or more representatives will be present.

During the past three years, the Carolina Festival has attracted over 200,000 visitors to the Charlotte area.

NATIONAL IMPORTANCE
Earl Crawford pointed out at the meeting from Charlotte during the large-scale festival between Philadelphia and New Orleans and that he would like to see the Carolina Festival make its festival one of increasing importance.

In departing from the Christmas theme, which has been widely criticized on the grounds of competition with the Christmas Eve festival, the directors of the festival expect to find a name which will indicate a very festive celebration.

It tentatively is planned to have some of the nationwide radio shows originate from Charlotte during the festival. Some colorful personalities will be invited, but unlike the festival program of the last three years, it is hoped that there will be far more participation on the local level.

This company has the backing of city officials in Piedmont and South Carolina communities. Some of their witnesses described Piedmont as their only hope of getting natural gas.

In addition to the seven Virginia cities, Piedmont proposed to serve the communities of Danville and the latter city did not in the meantime obtain gas in another case. Piedmont also listed Gainesville, Ga., as a prospective customer.

This company has proposed a 300-mile pipeline in time to supply natural gas to the Virginia cities by next winter.
