THE FACTS about American air power in the relation to the Russian situation are so simple. The basic, over-riding fact is this: Defense Secretary Louis Johnson's accurate measure of air power is not dollars or air power, but "airframes annually produced by the Air Force."

In fiscal 1949, the last pre-Johnson fiscal year, the Air Force has 600,000 pounds of airframe weight. In fiscal 1950, Johnson's successor, Forrestal, from Congressional appropriations and allowed by the Payne-Furness bill, airframe weight was slashed down to a bit over 21,000,000 pounds.
