

# \$500,000 Health Center Is Proposed For City

## PLANS TO BRING TO CHARLOTTE GERMAN 'AMERICA'

## State And U. S. Aid Available

Recommendation that plans proceed for construction of a \$500,000 health center with financial assistance from the State and Federal Governments was framed at a meeting of the City Health Advisory Committee last night.

Dr. M. B. Bethel, City Health Officer, was instructed to transmit the recommendation to the City Council through City Manager Henry A. Yancy and to emphasize the opportunity for financial grants from the appropriation of \$150,000,000 of Hill-Burton funds for Congress.

**STAFF NAMED**  
At last night's session Dr. Howard P. Stieger was elected chairman of the Health Board to succeed Dr. Monroe T. Gilmore, who resigned in January. Dr. W. L. Yensing, Jr., is acting chairman of the Council upon recommendation of the Mecklenburg Medical Society as a member to fill the vacancy caused by Dr. Gilmore's resignation.

Dr. Bethel said that as the result of the appropriation of funds under the Hill-Burton Act more money will be available for construction of health centers as well as hospitals.

#### 1945 Raid Figures In Red Inquiry

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The newly-revised American case of wartime charges of Government secrets has stirred fresh interests in Congress, along with Republican charges of "cover-up."

Promises of "a complete story" were made today by Senator Tydings (D-Md.), who declares "a lot of people are drawing conclusions about things of which they know nothing."

The magazine case cropped up recently in connection with the Senate investigation of charges by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis) that Communists have infiltrated the State Department.

Tydings is chairman of the Senate subcommittee investigating McCarthy's charges.

It came before the whole House last yesterday when Rep. Hobbs (D-Ia.) threw aside the official record which has shrouded Congress since 1946.

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### Tax Bill Authors Seek New Revenue

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congressional tax writers looked worried today as they considered their must still secure \$785,000,000 extra on taxpayers or risk a Presidential veto of their tax bill. At it stands, it would cut estate taxes by about \$1,800,000,000.

A speedy trip to expatriation tax payments, and possibly an increase in the corporate tax rate, appeared to be about the only big sources left in the hunt for bigger revenue.

The Treasury informed the Ways & Means Committee that on the basis of its actions thus far it is \$780,000,000 short of finding enough new revenue to cover the losses from excise and other tax cuts it has approved.

Mr. Truman suggested three sources for new revenue: to make up for excise cuts—bigger levies on corporations, on inheritance and big gifts, and phasing of tax law loopholes.

The committee already has rejected his proposals for \$400,000,000 in new levies on estates and gifts, and \$200,000,000 in new levies on corporations, and \$180,000,000 in new levies on gifts and inheritances.

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### Reorganization Plan Is Upheld

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate today upheld President Truman's plan for the reorganization of the Government.

The bill, known as the Executive Order Reorganization Act, passed by a vote of 64 to 29.

The bill would give the President authority to reorganize executive departments and agencies, subject to Senate confirmation of the reorganization plan.

The bill also would give the President authority to create new executive agencies, subject to Senate confirmation.

The bill was introduced in the Senate by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and passed by a vote of 64 to 29.
