Action Taken To Protest Tokyo Trial

8 Charged With Attacking Banks

TOKYO — (AP) — Openly defiant, Japan's Communist Party today ordered a general strike Saturday in re- sponse for the occupation's refusal of kicking and stoning American soldiers.

The strike called for bringing to a head growing tension between the Communist occupation and the belligerent Communist.

This tension, fueled by recent in- ternational Communist charges that the Japanese Reds were too docile, erupted Memorial Day in the first physical violence of the occupation against U. S. troops.

A captain and four enlisted men, charged with attacking an American rally in downtown Im- perial Park, were killed, wounded and arrested only a few hours ear- lier. Authorities had expelled the Communists from the park to per- mit Americans to hold Memorial Day services for their war dead, including those who fell in the Pacific.

MacArthur in a May 2 speech urged the Japanese to defend their own constitutional heritage against the "international political perfidy" of Communism. He suggested the possibility of outlawing Japan's Communist Party.

Opposes Congressional Restrictions Johnson Asks Power To Draft

He won partial support from Sen- ator McClellan (D-Calif.) who said he is changing his views because of what he called "unpleasant in- cidents" in the United States.
