Day by day the United States and the free nations joined with us are getting deeper and deeper into the Korean con-flict. Now the orders have gone out to the Air Force and the Nayy to bomb and shell targets north of the 38th Parallel. Those orders make sense, Certainly, if we are engaged in an air-out-flort to deteat the Korean Communist, we must seek to disrupt, their supply operations to the reast Yet these orders pose a new potential Yet these orders pose a new potential to the property of the possibility of the possibility of the possibility of Russian intervention has been the big calculated risk from the first, however, and these attacks on North Korea will hardly provoke the Soviet Bear into armed action unless Russis has already decided to fight.

If Russis intervenes, we may have to withdraw from Korea, Hanson W. Baldwin, military writer for the New York Times, says that "all authorities have long recognized that in case of a war with Russis, Southern Korea would be at least initially indefensable and any force committed.

IT WOULD BE the understatement of all time to say that General Douglas Mac-Arthur has a few critics here and there in the world. Hosts of American servicemen returned from the Far East with bitter recollections of the imperious gentleman. Bince his tour of occupation duty in Japan, he has accumulated other critics who have he has accumulated out of the military bureaucracy he has imposed on that nation. He is, we readily admit, a somewhat pompous, conceited, and arrogant specimen of the military

man.

But we believe we express the prevailing view when we say that. Douglas MacArthur is the man for the job at hand in the Far East today.

He has had years of experience in the

Far East. He knows the area and its peo-ple. He proved himself a master strategist and a daring designer of offensive military tactics. And, perhaps most important of all, his name carries tremendous prestige everywhere along the line of defense drawn earlier this week by President Tru-

man.

Now that the fateful decision has been made to send ground troops into action in Korea, MacArthur has all the elements he needs to set up a defense against the invaders and finally drive them back beyond the 38th Parallel. It is too early to know whether he has enough men and equipment to do the job in a hurry. But hell do it sooner or later. Of that we are sure.
