MR. MALIK TASTES DEFEAT

FINE United States' tremendous diplo-imatic victory in the United Nations Security Council yesterday may not speed victory in Korea or deter Russian-spon-sored aggression elsewhere. But it will be of incalculable value in arraying world opinion behind the United Nations effort to defeat the North Korean invaders and restore peace to that troubled nation.

The voting yesterday came at the end of three tense and dramatic days of paramentary maneuvering sparked by acritonious exchanges between the Sovietelegate, Jakob Malik, and the Americae, Warren Austin. The background

Austin's maneuver prompted hours of tharp debate, during which Malik revealed what is to be the Soviet propaganda line in the coming weeks—that the United States, not the North Koreans, is the aggressor in Korea, and that the United States, instead of desiring peace, desires



THE FARM BLOC WINS AGAIN

WE HAVE NOTED in these columns be-

WE HAVE NOTED in these columns be-fore that the farm bloc generally has the way in Congress. Just last week the blog successfully eliminated from Presider's Truman's emergency powers the authority to sell stored surplus commodities at the market price in an effort to hold farm prices in line. Yesterday, the bloc gained another and even more significant victory.

Mr. Truman had also asked for the
power to regulate margin requirements for
speculative commodity trading which created "sudden or unreasonable" price intercases. Secretary Brannan, testifying in
behalf of the measure, asid that some
speculators are eashing in on the Korean
War with complete disregard for the effect
on the economy or the war effort.

Brannan made public a report by the
Commodity Exchange Authority that reflected a sharp increase in commodity
trading since June 25. He said it was impairing the "normal function of the exchanges". He explained that Mr. Truman
wanted to require persons who deal is changes". He explained that Mr. Truman wanted to require persons who deal in commodity futures to put up more margin or a bigger down-payment on such deal-ings. (Margins, now set by the exchanges, are 10 to 15 per cent on major farm cor

Secretary Brannan told Congress furthermore that speculators who put up the min-imum amount could have made from 100 to 450 per cent on their investment since

to 450 per cent on "their investment since June 28. [
Well, yeaterday the House tentatively exempted commodity speculation from the emergency controls. On motion of Rep. Harold Cooley of North Carolinh, chairman of the House voted 164 to 71 to eliminate this power from the bill. The vote, significantly enough, was not recorded.

And so it goes. The farm bloc is willing for farmers and commodity speculators to make a killing out of the &Corean War. In all probability, the labor bloc will seek to exempt wages from controls. And, judging from the statement by Senate Majority Leader Lucas yesterday, there will be no immediate tax action against corporation profileering.
