Soviet Fails To Exclude Korea Envoys UN Considering Bombing Charges

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Russia made another unsuccessful effort today to exclude South Korean Ambassador John M. Chang from United Nations discussions.

The Soviet move was made by Andrei A. Malik, Russian delegate, immediately after the Security Council met to take up a Soviet resolution seeking to end Korean bombing attacks on both Korea. Malik said this resolution did not concern Chang in any way, since the "Byngman River clause" and Douglas MacArthur are not victims of the bombing but aggressors and "have no place here."

NO FORMAL CHARGE
Council President Sir Gladwyn Jebb of Britain ruled that the council already had decided that Chang had a right to take part in the discussion. Malik said he disagreed with the council's decision but it was a formal charge.

It was this issue of Korean representation that tied up the council in a procedural stalemate for the whole month of August, while Malik was present.

LIKE HITLER TECHNIQUE
He said the United States had borrowed the technique of total war from Hitler. The U. S. actions, he said, can be explained by the hatred of the American people for the people of Korea and the other peoples of Asia who are fighting for their freedom.

Malik's speech was largely a repetition of previous attacks made by him and by the North Korean regime in cables to the U. N. Malik said the U. N. had received more than 20,000 letters and telegrams protesting the bombings.

Malik quoted freely from dispatches from American newspapers and affidavits to avoid the effect of the bombings. He read one dispatch from AP Correspondent Hal Boyle saying that he flew over Yongdok after American air forces had bombed the Japanese city of Nagasaki after it was atom-bombed.
