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Conquest of Red Korea

SEUL, Korea—(AP)—United Nations forces seized the failing heart of Red Korea today.

Twin Allied spearheads occupied most of the Communist capital, Pyongyang.

Premier Kim Il Sung and his Soviet satellite regime reportedly fled to the north possibly as far as Red Chinese Manchuria or Soviet Siberia.

An end to the bitter war that started June 25 was in sight. But top Allied commanders have warned that guerrilla resistance may be ahead.

On both the east and west coasts the Allies were pressing closer to Manchuria.

In Pyongyang, nothing stood in the way of the army, grinding back the U. S. and British troops.

The South Korean division thrust in from the east afterwards.

Senate Hearing Discloses Oil Recently Shipped To Chinese Reds

By JOHN CHADWICK Washington Staff of Commerce Dept. official testified today that a considerable portion of 24,000 drums of oil shipped to Communist China from Japan after the Korean war started last April 30.

The testimony came from Edward O'Connell, assistant chief of the investigation staff of the department's Office of International Trade.

It was apparent before a Senate subcommittee which is investigating reports that some Communist ships have been hauling strategic materials to Red China.

Senator O'Connor commented during the hearing that "our information is that about 12,000 drums actually went to Communist China as late as August of this year."

He said that they included both oil and other commodities of foreign origin. He said he was unable to identify them at this time because the department's investigation is incomplete.
