### 'REBELLION' IN PUERTO RICO

THE AMERICAN people will make a serious mistake if they jump to the wrong cenclusion about the "rebellon" against the U.S. authority in the Carlbbean island of Puerto Rico. Some of the early new dispatches left the impression that the Nationalist Party is a potent factor in the island's political life. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Puerto Ricans are fiercely patriotic. They are proud of their Island, of their language, of their culture. Even when they find fame and fortune in other parts of the world, they keep a plot of ground on the Emerald alse to which they hope to the Emerald alse to which they hope to Bit the overwhelming majority of Puerto Ricans are also proud of the American citizenship bestowed upon them by the United States Government. They are happy that an enlightened U. 8. policy has given them virtually all the instruments of self-government. And they are grateful that this nation has shelled out countless of millions of dollars since 1900 to help them combat the traditional problems of overpopulation and poverty and disease that

afflict most Caribbean Islands.

The more conservative political groups on the Island prefer statehood as the final solution of the status question. The dominant Popular Party, headed by the current governor, Luis Munos Marin, has steered a course between the two extremes of statehood and outright independence, seeking virtually complete self-government while retaining its political and economic ties with the United States.

The Nationalists, led for years by the flery and irresponshible Pedro Albinu Campoon, number not more than a tiny fraction of the total population. They are well oreanized, and millitant, and they make a fluss all out of proportion to their numbers or the popularity of their cause. The current flare-up of violence has been interpreted as a protest against the new constitution upon which Puerto Ricans will vote on Nov. 4. More probably it is the dying gasp of a political movement that was doomed to failure from the moment the United States Congress decided to lift the ancient restrictions upon Puerto Rican political liberty and permit the islanders to govern themselves.

THERE are several qualifications that a supreme commander of the Atlantic Pact defense program should have:

1. He should be a man of great international reputation, whose personal prestige would give greater weight to his actions.

2. Its should be a first-rate military trategist, preferably with wide experience in welding together air, ground and sea forces into one compact organization.

2. He should be a man of tact and diplomacy, one who can smooth out the inevitable wrinkles that will develop in any joint enterprise of various nations.

4. He should have been exposed, at least, to civilian life so that he may have a broader understanding of the historical and philosophical significance of this great project.

5. He should, by all rights, be an Ameran, and one who has the complete condence and trust of the American people and the American Congress. This is undamental, for the success of the Atlan-

tic defense effort will hang upon the continued support given by this nation.

There are other qualifications, to be sure but those are sufficient to show why does not come being the shown and for the job. As yet, there has been no nofficial announcement that he has been asked to take the post by President Truman. As yet, the Allantie Pact defenses committee has not extended an invitation to Eisenhower, or to any other individual. We have only the General's reminder that he is a soldier, and will be glad to serve anywhere he is needed.

The American people are not ready to onsign General Eisenhower to military consign General Eisenhower to mintary affairs for the rest of his life. Millions of them would like to see him in the Presi-dency. But 1952 is still two years off, and these two years will be the critical period in the new democratic regional defense project. Eisenhower can handle the defense command and still be available for politi-cal office. We hope that he will.

### TWO WAYS OF BORROWING

TOMORROW Mecklenburg County will retire \$300,000 in railroad bonds orig-inally issued in 1870. The bonds were for a deserving purpose: to bring railroads to Charlotte. But successive boards of County Charlotte. But successive boards of County Commissioner failed to lay aside money to repay the principal. Twice since 1870, when the bonds became due, they were simply refunded, and it was not until the late G. D. Bradshaw, County Auditor, began putting money into a sinking fund that it became possible to retire the bonds. Mean-while, some \$1,440,000 has been paid out in interest—almost five times the princi-ral.

There is a moral for this generation in the event, and it can perhaps best be pointed up by reference to an editorial in the Winston-Salem Journal several weeks ago. That newspaper chiefed the Charlotte papers for "inconsistency" in that they have been critical of deficit financing by the Federal Covernment while endorsing the various and sundry local bond issues.

There is a vast difference today between

local deficit financing and Federal deficit financing. When local governments borrow money today, they do so with the definite intention of paying it back on a remainintention of paying it back on a regular schedule, and they make provision in their budgets for doing so. When Uncle Sam borrows money, there is no thought of paying it back. Uncle Sam merely refunds the huge national debt from time to time, just as earlier boards of Mecklenburg Commissioners did with the old railroad bonds.

Hence, we see no inconsistency in opposing Federal deficit financing and favoring local bond issues. And if To-Journal will tend to its own knitting. Winston-Salem might become the bustling city that Charlotte is.

#### **FALL COLOR IN TREES**

FRANK KOWALK, whose business is trees, furnishes this statement by Frank Pipal, Omaha city forester, on how old Mother Nature splatters trees:
"Jack Frost is not responsible, as commonly supposed, for the coloring of the Jeaves. Many leaves turn even before there

"When Nature gives the signal the leaf stalk develops a special layer of cells at the point where it is attached to the twig. staik develops a special layer or cein at the point where it is attached to the twig. Another layer, next to it, forms cork-like cells without any open passages. This prevents the flow of raw sap into the leaf and gradually alows down, and eventually stops the process of food manufacturing and formation of the green coloring matter, known as chlorophyll. When this process ceases entirely the chlorophyll disappears and under it are exposed tiny crystals (plastids), which are yellow and known as carotin and anthophyll. They are also found in large numbers in carotis and yolks of eggs. These crystals give the leaves the yellow color, and we find their best showing in cottonwoods and soft maples.

maples.

The most gorgeous colors are the scar-let, red, and their mixtures with yellow. They are produced by the accumulation of sugar in the leaves, which produces a coloring matter known as anthocyanin. The more sugar the deeper the red. The best display of this coloring is found in sugar and other maples, some coks, sumse, certain varieties of Viburnum and Euony-mous.

"The prevalance and the brilliance of the Fall colors depend a great deal on the preceding weather. Pienty of sunshine, sufficient moisture and cool nights follow-ing warm days, give best results. Drouth, cloudiness and warm nights give poorest results.

results.

"Sunshine is absolutely necessary to manufacture sugars. That is the reason why trees and plants most exposed to the sun, especially the afternoon sun have accumulated large supplies of sugars and produce the best coloring. This is an important point to remember when planting trees or shrubs which are known to produce brilliant coloring. If planted in abady apots the results will be disappointing.

"After some very cool nights and frosts Nature gives another signal, and the special layer of cells mentioned above sep-arates and the leaves fall.

"The Indians had a rather interesting interpretation of the leaf coloring phenomenon. The celestial hunters had slain the Great Bear, and his blood driphing on the forests changed many trees to red. Other trees were turned yellow by the fat which spatiered out of the kettle as the hunters cooked the meat."
