WASHINGTON-(AP)-President Truman asked Congress today to vote all the men and armed strength needed to run back the Communist armies in Korea and to block armed aggression elsewhere in the world.

He reserved for the future such more drastic measures as price control and rationing and called upon all Americans to avoid them through voluntary restraint.

The President made clear that his \$10,000,000,000 program was only the beginning. He foretold the early need of more billions to reinforce the millitary strength of the North Atlantic powers bordering Soviet Communism in Europe. He said higher defense spending would go on for

And the future? Mr. Truman coupled emphasis on United Nations attion in Korea with a warning against further aggression clearly aimed at Marshal Stalin in Moscow, His words:

"The free world has made it clear, through the United Nations, that lawless aggression will be met with force. This is the significance of Korea—and it is a significance whose importance cannot be over-estimated.

"I shall not attempt to predict the course of events, But I am sure that those who have it in their power to unleash or withhold acts of armed aggression must realize that new recourse to aggression in the world today might well strain to the breaking point the fabric of world peace."

ASKS BIGGER FORCES
