But, in the intervals between adding up the "points" on which they are to be discharged, many of them and their eyes were turned, for the most part, toward the mountains.

U.S. Demands U.S. Forces Leave Korea

MOSCOW (AP)—A high level Russian demand for the United Nations to expel American armed forces from Korea today highlighted a flood of Soviet press criticism of U.S. military intervention in the Far East.

In a lengthy statement bristling with accusations against the U. S., Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko declared: "The United Nations will only fulfill its obligations to maintain peace if the Security Council rejects the unconditional cessation of American military intervention and the immediate withdrawal of the American armed forces from Korea."

His words were echoed in the leading Russian papers. Here were some of the headlines: "Soviet people demand immediate ending of the American intervention in Korea—lavastia, the Government organ."

ACCUSE LIE The statement accused U. N. Secretary-General Trygve Lie of "deliberately assisting" in violation of the U. N. charter by the Government of the United States and by other members of the Security Council.
