### Bill Would Cancel Order Of April 17 Measure Now Goes To Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House voted today to restore city mail service to two deliveries a day. It passed and sent to the Senate a bill ordering the Post Office Department to cancel an April 17 order cutting city home deliveries to one daily and curtailing other services.

## Rail Seizure Not Planned By Truman

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House said today that President Truman has no thought of seizing the railroads to avert a threatened nationwide strike.

Spoken for 300,000 trimmen and conductors appeared today to the President yesterday to let the roads after negotiations with stevedores ended in a deadlock.

Roose told a news conference that "seizure of the railroads is not being considered."

The railroad spokesman said Kennedy had informed the White House that the railroads are not planning to strike.

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## Red China May Aid N. Korea

HONG KONG (AP)—A dispatch from Nationalist China today reported Russia and Communist China have agreed to rush 100,000 Chinese troops to fight against the North Koreans.

The dispatch, dated Taipei (Canton), said the agreement was signed in Moscow by Red Army Gen. Mao Tse Tung and Red Chinese Gen. Peng Dehuai.

TOKYO (Thursday)—(AP)—Red Korean troops were reported retreating in panic across the Naktong River Wednesday under bombing of 98 American B-29s.

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## House Okay Due On Bill Swelling Social Security

WASHINGTON (AP)—A final House O. K. is due today on legislation to expand social security coverage and hiking benefits.

All signs pointed to an administration defeat on one section in advance of final action.

President Truman and other administration leaders have vigorously backed the general idea of the bill but object to an amendment put in by Senator Knowland (R-Calif.).

Rep. Lynch (D-N.Y.), a member of the House Ways and Means Committee, is expected to introduce the bill.

The bill would increase the maximum benefit for a family from \$100 to \$150 a month.

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## Glenn Approval For AEC Is Recommended

Glenn, 46-year-old president of Case Institute of Technology in Cleveland, was nominated by President Truman last week for a five-year term.
