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Sen. Langer Collapses On Floor House Overrides Truman Objections

By JOHN CHADWICK WASHINGTON (AP)—A small group of Senators carried on their uphill battle today to uphold President Truman's veto of a controversial Communist control bill, undeterred by the collapse of one of their number on the Senate floor.

Senator Langer (R-ND) sagged to the floor, gasping for breath, and was taken to the Naval hospital at nearby Bethesda, Md. This brought a dramatic interruption to the all-night talkathon he and a handful of his colleagues were waging against the bill.

They had little or no hope of succeeding, despite the strong tenor of Mr. Truman's veto. He had used such words as "hystrical," "hasty" and "considerate," and had said the measure would make "a mockery of the Bill of Rights."

Mr. Truman's own Senate lieutenant, Floor Leader Lucas of Illinois, told his colleagues he would vote to override the veto. Lucas said he would vote for the bill when it passed the Senate originally.

Langer, who will be 64 on Sept. 30, was carried from the Senate chamber on a stretcher after his collapse. He was taken to the Naval hospital at Bethesda, Md., where he was placed in a semi-conscious condition. Dr. George Oliver, the Capitol physician, said Langer had started speaking at 10:50 P. M. EST last night and collapsed at 4:18 A. M. today, almost five and a half hours later.

Supporters of the bill had been sitting back determined to let his opponents talk themselves out. They were confident they had the votes to write the measure into law.

The House had already overridden Mr. Truman's objection, with a vote of 386 to 296 on Sept. 20. That was 65 votes more than the necessary two-thirds majority.

The all-night talk-fest threatened to draw a wrench into Congress, plans to adjourn sometime today, after the election.

The Senate, on Lucas' motion, reconsidered its earlier adoption of a resolution providing for a recess. The effect was to nullify the previous approval of the resolution, but the Senate can adopt it again later.

SENATE VOTE BLOCKED Senator Douglas (D-Ill.) proposed a Senate recess until 1 P. M. with an agreement, with Senator McCarran (D-Nev.), principal sponsor of the bill, that Douglas suggested that the Senate be a break-through vote during the recess. The measure was passed during the recess.

"I might well reach a wise conclusion after the people have had a chance to see the bill," Douglas said. "I will speak against the bill. The weariness and tension of the day will be a factor in the decision."

The aircraft was last seen at 10:30 P. M. on Sept. 20. The bomber was carrying a full complement of crew and passengers. The search area covers a vast region of the Atlantic Ocean.
