## 120 Local Men Sworn In Nothing To It: Take One Step And You're In The Army Now

About 120 Mecklenburg men took one of the most important steps of their lives today when they stepped into the Army of the United States. And "stepped" is the literal word because under the current regulations for induction a man is taken into service when he takes one step on the command of the induction officer. First Lt. Robert Burns simply called out each man's name, said, "Take one step forward." When they obeyed the command they were in the Army.

Later the drafted men talked their hands and were allegiance to the United States, but by then they were already members of the armed forces.

**FIRST STEP 1948**

They were the first to be drafted in Mecklenburg since inductions under the Selective Service law were halted in late 1948. They were joined by 20 Wilkes County men who were brought here by bus.

**TOKYO — (AP) —** Allied forces stabbed deep inside Seoul tonight against desperate Red Korean resistance.

To the southeast, U. S. First Cavalry armored patrols drove into Chongju, only 40 miles from the nearest point of the Korean second front spreading out from the Incheon-Seoul beachhead.

## Re Establishment Of 38th As Korean Dividing Line Urged

NEW YORK — (AP) — Yugoslav Vice Premier Edvard Kardelj called today for the temporary re-establishment of the 38th parallel as the demarcation line in Korea. He attacked those supporting North Korean aggressive course.

In a policy speech before the U. N. General Assembly, the Yugoslav official declared that the Marshall Plan's Government of the Government of North Korea does not serve the cause of the true independence and unity of the Korean people.

In the same speech he charged that the Soviet bloc is increasing the pressure on Yugoslavia by provoking border incidents along the 49th parallel.

**COMMITTEE NAMES**

Although he did not mention the Soviet Union or Communist China by name, Kardelj's meaning on Korea was obvious when he said: "Those who are inspiring the policy and activities of the North Korean Government have embarked upon an aggressive course, whose consequences will have to be borne by the people of the whole world."

Kardelj's statement regarding the 38th parallel came at a time when it appeared likely U. N. forces in Korea might reach the achievement of Korean unity—no specific reference to U. N. troops. In the Security Council, Yugoslavia abstained on the resolution ordering military action against North Korea.

The United Nations, Kardelj said, "should strive to find a solution which would bring about a cessation of hostilities and the temporary re-establishment—pending the achievement of Korean unity—of the former demarcation line along the 38th parallel."

## Brannan Raps Farm Bureau Leadership

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Brannan today charged the leadership of the American Farm Bureau Federation with making "untruthful and vicious" attacks on him in their fight over the farm program.

Brannan said in a letter to Federation President Allan B. Kline that a spokesman and a publication of the farm organization have incited and misled the public with regard to reserves of farm crops.

The letter was another round in a Brannan-Kline feud that grew out of a Brannan proposal last year to permit the government to buy farm products by means of government purchases.

Under the Brannan plan, a consumer would be lower than under the present price support system in which the government buys and removes surplus perishables from the market.

**KLINE AGAINST PLAN**

Kline has made many speeches bitterly opposing the Brannan plan.

Brannan wrote that Kline's personal spokesman, Roger Fleming, chief of the bureau's Washington office, said in a speech at Columbia, Tenn., Aug. 1, that the Brannan plan would have "disrupted the reserves of corn, cotton, wheat and other staples."

Brannan said this statement "was repeated in a farm bureau publication."

"It is an attack designed to use the Korean situation as a means of destroying the confidence of all groups of Americans, not just farmers, in the present administration of farm programs."

Brannan said no one has been more aggressive than himself in advocating high production levels and maintenance of "the essential reserves of farm products."

## Federal Income Running Ahead Of Expenditures

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Monthly income tax payments in September, mostly from corporations, have put the Government's receipts ahead of its spending for the first time since this fiscal year began July 1.

The Treasury reported today that, as of Sept. 21, revenue topped expenditures by \$28,219,257.

That was considerably better showing than a year ago when the Government had a deficit of \$1,892,212 at this point. It ended that fiscal year last June 30 in the red by \$1,822,103,357.

In the July 1-Sept. 21 period this year, the Government took in \$2,116,725,653 compared to \$1,698,310,081 in the similar period last year. Outlays this year were \$1,797,508,199 compared to \$1,892,212,357 a year ago.

Some officials say the Government may have a surplus this fiscal year with a surplus despite the costs of the Korean fighting and rearmament.

Increased tax collections, pushed up by the Oct. 1 hike in tax rates, and a lag in spending the new defense appropriations, are expected to contribute to that result.

**U. S. MARINES GAIN**

## 55 War Dead Listed In New Casualty List

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Defense Dept. today released a Korean casualty list (No. 106) containing the names of 231 servicemen, of whom 55 are dead.

The death list included nineteen passengers aboard a Navy transport which crashed into the sea near Kure, Japan, in the Marshall Islands, Sept. 18. In addition, seven crewmen died by the crash.

## B-50 Crew Survives Crash Parachutists Dropped To Rescue Fliers

HALIFAX, N. S. — (AP) — Parachutists have been dropped to begin rescue operations for 16 United States airmen whose B-50 bomber crashed Thursday in Labrador.

The aircraft, a B-50 Superfortress, was reported today.

The stricken bomber was discovered last night after being missing for three days, and a U. S. Air Force team immediately took steps to rescue the men by helicopter. The helicopter will move the men to a nearby lake, where a tugboat will pick them up.

The B-50 Air Force unit at Goose Bay began immediate preparations to rescue the crew. The plane was downed in the Labrador wilderness, the Fort Peppard Air Base reported today.
