SENATORS REFER TROOP ISSUE TO COMMITTEES

Wherry's Resolution Given Study
Connally Informs No Sidetracking

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Senate today, by unanimous consent, sent to its foreign relations and armed services committees a resolution on the controversial troops-to-Europe issue.
The resolution, sponsored by Senator Wherry (R-Nebr.), proposed that the Senate instruct the two committees to recommend by Feb. 2 legislation which would bar President Truman from committing troops to the North Atlantic defense force until Congress passes on that action.

WHERRY GIVEN PROMISE
Connally, in reply to a series of questions by Wherry, promised that the resolution would be held in abeyance in committee. He refused to promise that the measure would be returned to the committee at any definite time, however.
The language calling for return Feb. 2 remained in the resolution.

New Peace Effort By U.S. Favored Britain's Attlee Clings To Hope

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—Communist China's revised peace formula for Korea appeared today to have given impetus to continue United Nations efforts toward a cease-fire.

Four Red Jet Planes Showdown Wonju Retaken By UN Forces

TOKYO—(AP)—American Thunderjets streaking over northwest Korea shot down four Russian-made MIG-15s today in history's biggest jet air battle.
The F-4s also scored one more kill and damaged four probable MiG-15s.

On the ground, Allied combat teams Tuesday recaptured the central road-rail hub of Wonju and its airstrip. They also secured nearby air bases, forming a force of nearly 100 Red-led fighters with an artillery barrage. A spokesman said U. S. F-4s found 19 A. M. EST Tuesday that United Nations forces were "in control of all Wonju."

FIGHTING RAGES
Thirty-one miles southeast, Allied forces were battling Red forces near Yongju. Heavy fighting also raged southeast of Tanjung.
In the air, eight F-4s and five Mustangs tangled with 18 to 20 MIGs over Sinju, just across the Yalu River from Manchuria.

There was a real commotion, a real mixup, said one airman.
Then the swift jets in flight of four rocketed and machine-gunned the field while other F-4s flew over.
