MOB VIOLENCE IN TAR HEELIA

COLUMBUS COUNTY, N. C., is adjament cent to Horry County, S. C. where many acts of mob violence have taken place in recent months. That may or may not explain why a gang of white nightiders broke into the home of a Columbus County Negro last Thursday might and, finding he had fied, best up

In any event, the incident demands the sternest possible action. Whether the nightiders were renegades from across the border, or Columbus County men, they ought to be brought to justice swillty.

The report of Sheiff Blue desired it was not until Monday night—four days after the event—hat Sheiff Nance made the news public. He explained that he kept it quiet to aid the investigation, but that no was had been able to identify any of the men and that no clues had turned up.

This News hopes that the people of Columbus County will not be satisfied with that kind of official secrecy, which

all too frequently is used to cover up inaction rather than to facilitate inves-tigation. Sheriff Nance should have turned tigation. Sheriif Nance shound have turned on the public spotlight immediately, and should have called on all the citizens of Columbus County to come forward with any information they might have about the identity of the mobsters.

North Carolina has been singularly free of mob violence. One reason is that our local law enforcement officers are not so intimidated by mobaters as they are in some other areas of the South. Another is that the full resources of our State Government have always been at the command of local officials.

GROWTH OF THE HIGHWAY FUND

Main factor in the revenue picture is the rapid increase in motor vehicle registrations in North Carolina. The January issue of Motor Age reports that registrations in this state jumped from 599,645 in 1949 to 1,941,00 in 1950—a percentage increase of 15.72.

Significantly, the percentage increase in Significantly, the percentage increase in North Carolina was the second largest of any state in the Union, being exceeded only by tiny Delaware with an increase of 28.21 per cent. If this trend continues (and Governor Scott emphasizes that the \$200.00.000 secondary road program will accelerate the pace). the Highway Fund revenue will go way past \$100.000.000 in a few year:

THE News believes that there will be enough money in the Highway Fund to take care of the city street problem without additional new taxes, and hasn't yet abaidoned hope that Governor Scott and the Highway Commission will start looking for a way to share existing revenue in-stead of insisting on new revenue.
