Now Britain is reported ready to agree to appointment of an American commander in the Atlantic. British concurrence is made possible by a maneuver in the usual tradition of bureincray—a new command has been created, that of the English Channel, and a Briton will head it.

Somehow, this bickering over nationality et commander strikes us as not being in

keeping with the philosophy behind Atlantic defense. Logic, it seems in our admittedly unnautical mind, would have suggested a British commander in the Mediterranean, which contains the great British naval bases of Gibraltar and Cyprus, and an American in the Atlantic. CONFUSION still clouds details of the murder of U. S. prisoners in Korea. General Ridgway has now confirmed the murder of 385 Americans and reported "considerable evidence" that about 6,000 Americans have been the victims of atrocity, killing. General Ridgway made it clear that the strocity deaths do not involve an increase in the number of known dead. All known deaths, he said, had been disclosed to next of kin and he regretted the needless anxiety caused relatives of missing men by the report released from Korea by Colonel Hanley last week.

Presumably, although it is not yet clear, the number of dead listed in the Hanley figure included soldiers whose murder had been reported previously in the frequent accounts of such savagery. That is of course untrue, as any of millions of European Jews, as any of the thousands of Polish officers killed in Katya Forest could tell you if they could speak from their graves. The tens of thousands of women and children killed by the A-bomb or its effects in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, or burned alive by fire bombs in Germany or Japan, could convincingly

argue, were they alive, that their death was as atrocious as that of soldiers shot, stabbed or bludgeoned to death in Korea. Prisoners of every nationality have been numdered, during the fury which goes with battle, by Russians, Chinese, Germans, Englishmen, Turks, Frenchmen, Americans and other nationalities, Early in World Warl II this country made much of "pinpoint" bombing—we would not bomb civilians, but merely hit the strictly military targets. "Pinpoint" bombing, which never lived up to its name, was replaced by "blanket bombing", then the fire bomb, particularly effective on Japanese bomes, was added, and finally the A-bomb. The considerably changed outlook of Americans.



Defective Tank Turrets
