### 3 Killed, 200 Hurt In Red Riot In Tehran

TEHRAN, Iran.—At least three persons were killed and more than 200 injured today in a five-hour battle between 5,000 yelling Communists and 2,000 police and troops backed by angry mobs of nationalists.

### Worst Violence In Iran Since June

Police and troops got control of the situation early this afternoon, after using tear gas, fire hoses, rifle butts and clubs. At least two rioters were wounded by police gunfire, although most of the people fired into the air.
