WASHINGTON — Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) today told a group of President Truman's Chicago Federal judges nominees that precedent is against his confirmation.

British Mission Reaches Iran

TEHRAN, Iran — A British Cabinet mission arrived today for new talks on the Iranian oil nationalization dispute.

The mission, headed by Richard R. Stokes, lord privy seal, was met at the airport by W. Averell Harriman, American trouble-shooter in the Iranian oil crisis, and Javad Buehri, Iranian minister of roads.

The British will be guests of Harriman tonight and will see Premier Mohammed Mossadegh tomorrow.

Mossadegh made an appearance today before the Senate, where he praised Harriman for his "sincere efforts" to pave the way for new negotiations.

At the same time, Mossadegh outlined the terms of yesterday's agreement to resume talks — disclosing he apparently has dropped Iran's old ironclad insistence on carrying her drastic oil nationalization law out to the letter.

It is apparent the 76-year-old negotiator is awaiting public reaction to the new talks.

The wily, nationalistic Mossadegh did not say in any words that he offered a compromise to Britain. But it is plain from the exchange of notes that both sides gave in somewhat.

Mossadegh said Britain has accepted Iran's nationalization law of last March, which ordered the takeover from the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. (AIOC) in general language. Then he said Iran has agreed to discuss the carrying out of nationalization "on these parts which deal with the interests of Britain."

This is a big concession by Mossadegh. In the past, he had claimed he could not back up on the second nine-point nationalization law passed in May without causing widespread protest by the Iranian people. This law provided for stripping the British of oil profits, management, and installations — including the world's biggest refinery at Abadan.

Reids Resist Allied Attacks In Colorado Flood

PORT COLLINS, Colo. — Flood waters smashed today at Northern Colorado in the wake of torrential rains and five persons were reported to have perished.

A cloudburst last night flung a six-foot wall of water down the Big Thompson River, well known to tourists visiting Rocky Mountain National Park, and other streams also ran high.

Householders and motorists had to abandon homes and automobiles in a scramble for high ground. Some even took to trees until the flash floods subsided.

Four members of a family named Johnson — father, mother and two daughters aged 15 and 14 — were reported to have drowned when flood waters swept over a resort called "Dad's Place" which they operated. This is midway between Loveland, a plain city 40 miles north of Denver, and the mountain resort town of Estes Park.

Residents of Buckhannon, Conn., and Andersonville, just east of Fort Collins, were evacuated as the Poudre gushed water from mountain cloudbursts. Several highways were blocked by water and rock and dirt slides.

He said rescue parties were forced to go to Loveland to a bridge carrying U. S. 87-87 in an attempt to reach persons marooned in trees on the south side of the river.

Waters from the Cache La Poudre River washed across parts of Fort Collins and flooded the campus of Colorado A & M College. Water was five and a half feet deep in the college heating plant.

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Grandmother With 2 Mates Faces Embezzlement Count

LOS ANGELES — Mrs. Bernice Emerick, 48, and two daughters, Ohio, grandmother, is in jail on embezzlement charges and a \$20,000 bond.

The couple were wed after a whirlwind romance in Las Vegas, Nev., and were to leave today for a Honolulu honeymoon, but FBI agents arrested Mrs. Emerick yesterday when she called for her luggage at the union station here.

Authorities said Mrs. Emerick, secretary-treasurer of the Wright Credit Union at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, left Dayton July 3, and that a preliminary hearing indicated that more than \$20,000 is missing. A. P. Othoff, chief of the Cincinnati FBI office, said he had access to the union's deposits of \$20,000.

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Ridgway Holds Long Conference

TOKYO (Sundays) — Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway left his headquarters in Korea today after an unusual, six-hour closely guarded conference with his top aides. Chinese interceptors were present.

The conference ending at 3 A. M. (12 noon EST, Saturday) followed a general and odd-sounding headquarters statement that the Allies want a cease-fire buffer zone located between the Yalu River on the Manchurian border and the present battle lines.

Among those in session with the conference commander were his chief of staff, Lt. Gen. Doyle Hickey, and Brig. Gen. Edwin K. Walker, chief of the headquarters operations section.

Ridgway left the building so hurriedly that newsmen were unable to question him.

Several hours after he arrived at his office, three jeeps pulled up in front of the main left building. They contained service personnel from the headquarters interpreting and translation section.

There was no indication what the conference was about.

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Photographers who were told that no statement would be forthcoming and no pictures would be permitted.

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Ship In Distress Off Alaska Coast

SEATTLE — An unidentified ship sent out distress signals today, reporting it was "sinking rapidly."

The Coast Guard said the vessel was 100 miles off the coast of Alaska and it was seven miles off the Coronados Islands, which are adjacent to Prince of Wales Island.

Earlier, two separate coils, a radio frequency transmitter, a freighter and the other involving two tugs, were reported in waters off the northwest coast, in which the vessel said it needed assistance.

One man aboard the tanker was killed. One tug sank and a crew member was reported missing.
