A LESSON FOR THE FUTURE

NO TIME FOR BACK-SLIDING

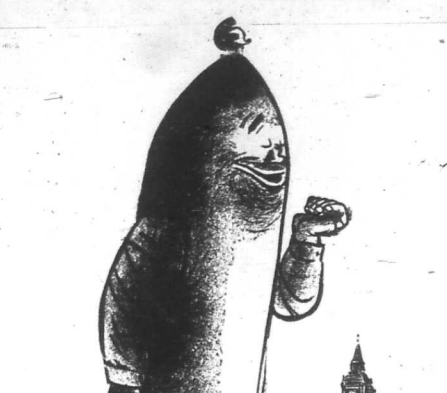

Experts Think Living Costs Will Hold Steady This Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—The SCARE talk about inflation from President Truman and his top economic advisers has left the impression in the country that day after tomorrow the price tags will be marked up as one consequence of the weakened controls bill passed by Congress last week that is not true, say the experts who must try to estimate what is actually going to happen.

As they see it, the cost of living index could hold fairly steady until the end of the year. It is now at 183.2. It could go to 190 by January 1, but even this is not a probability. Since food has a weight of three per cent in the index, a drop in computing the index, even a slight decline in prices at the grocery store would mean that the landlord will not be able to raise the rent bill.

More Inflation Coming This does not mean, however, that the stern warnings on inflation are political or were merely intended to try to scare Congress into passing a tougher law. The experts agree that more inflation is bound to come, short of a general agreement of a political development such as a world disarmament conference, which does not seem to be in the cards. Their only disagreement is on timing.

A study of the price curve during the last six weeks shows that there have been other comparatively dormant periods like the present when people were not spending money. In 1946 when the drive was on to take off price controls, the National Association of Manufacturers in full-page ads proclaimed that American industry could produce so fast and so cheaply that prices would go up even though all controls were abruptly removed.
