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Ex-Generals Lead Brief Uprising Defeated Rebels

BUENOS AIRES, (AP) — The official state radio announced revolt and civil war broke out today against the Government of President Juan D. Peron, but the revolt was swiftly crushed and its leaders were in flight.

By state account, the uprising lasted only a few hours. Shortly after announcing the outbreak of civil war, the radio said the revolt headed by former Gen. Arturo Rawson and former Gen. Benjamin Menendez was crushed completely, and both had fled.

The Government announced Peron would make a speech this afternoon to the people from a balcony of his presidential palace, the Casa Rosada (Pink House).

The Government radio, proclaiming a state of "internal war" and a state of siege, identified Rawson and Menendez as ringleaders of the uprising, and threatened execution for any military leaders who joined them.

There were many rumors of troop movements, but these, too, could not be confirmed.

There was no information available from other sources. The supplies were pouring into the Plaza De Mayo in front of Peron's office, shouting "La vida por Peron" and "Peron vive" (Peron lives with business establishments shut).

Bradley In Tokyo; Talks With Ridgway

JCS Chairman May Help Map New Strategy

Communists Rebuff Site Change Proposal
TOKYO.—Gen. Omar Bradley arrived tonight, possibly this morning, to meet with Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme Allied commander.

The Defense Department in Washington said Bradley would survey all aspects of the situation with Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, supreme Allied commander.

Ridgway yesterday suggested a switch in the truce talk site in an effort to revive the stalled armistice talks.

Peiping radio treated Ridgway's proposal with rough language. In a broadcast tonight as Bradley's plane was winging its last few miles to Tokyo, it accused Ridgway of "carrying out orders from Washington to use the change of conference site question to block the resumption" of truce talks.

The Reds broke off armistice talks Aug. 27. They accused the United Nations of violating the neutrality of Kaesong. The charge was denied.

Under the pessimism were U. N. reports of masses of enemy trucks moving toward the battle front and a "surge" of Communist attacks all along the battle line.

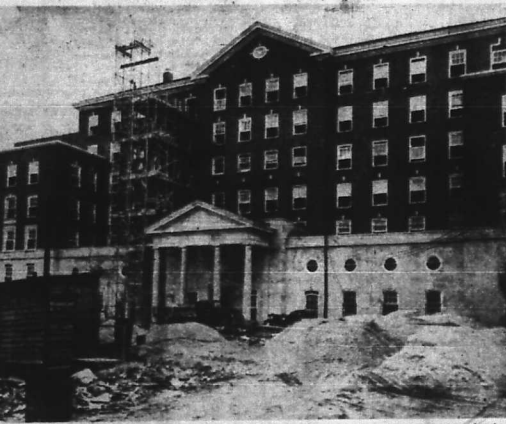
Reds Launch Sharp Attacks in Korea

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea (AP) — Communist forces launched a series of sharp attacks last night at widely scattered points across 50 miles of the Korean battle front.

The Reds lobbed artillery and mortar shells throughout Thursday night at Allied infantrymen dug in just below the crest of Heartbreak Hill north of Yangju.

Other Red troops attacked American and South Korean troops holding a hill west of the ridge. They had captured it only Tuesday. The light raged on into the morning.

Final BOYLE STORY TO BE TOLD BY REPORTER

Paper's Charges Led To Probe In Lighthof Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—A newspaper reporter was invited today to tell Senators the basis for his accusations that Democratic National Chairman William M. Boyle Jr. received \$8,000 from a client who got a big government loan.

Boyle told the Senate Investigations subcommittee yesterday he collected \$1,250 in retainer fees from the client, but the fees had nothing to do with the government loans.

Boyle denied he ever tried to influence the RFC or any other government agency and the Senators heard no testimony that he had.

Boyle concluded in testimony yesterday that he was "acting chairman" of the Democratic party at that time, although drawing no salary as its titular vice chairman under J. Howard McGrath.

Boyle was arrested today on charges of perjury and deception against U. S. People.
