Death Takes 37 On Highway

328 Lose Lives In Auto Wrecks

Motorists have racked up a bloody death toll on U. S. highways during the Labor Day holiday and they still face homebound traffic.

Seven members of the Fort Worth Negro family were killed and three others injured Sunday night when their auto collided with a truck south of Fort Worth.

At Aitkin, Minn., seven members of the family lost their lives after their car overturned in plunging into a eight foot deep water-filled ditch.

The largest single accident during the holiday was a fishing boat disaster that claimed 37 lives Saturday.

The Associated Press survey of deaths began at 6 p. m. Friday and will continue to midnight Monday.

During this period in 1950 there were 383 traffic deaths, 80 drownings, 98 miscellaneous deaths.

Flier Dies in Clinton Crash

CLINTON, N. C. (AP)—One flier died in the flames of an Air Force F-52 which crashed and burned in the woods south of here early today, police Chief E. L. Crumrine said.

The chief said three other crew members parachuted to safety.

The public information office of the Ninth Air Force identified the three survivors as Capt. R. L. Hunsaker, the pilot; of Topeka, Kan.; Edward C. Bouchereau, the crew chief, of New Orleans; and S/SGT. J. A. Burrows, a navigator, of New York.

The plane was on a routine training flight from Love Field, Dallas, Tex., to Langley Air Force Base in Virginia.
