U. N. To Exhaust All Means To Secure Truce In Korea

WASHINGTON (AP)—Officials said today that the United States and its allies are determined to exhaust every reasonable means of obtaining an agreement on an armistice in the Korean truce negotiations. They expressed hope that the present prolonged deadlock over the airfield and prisoner-of-war issues eventually would be resolved. They said they definitely would be if the Reds sincerely wanted to end the Korean fighting. These authorities conceded, however, that the negotiations which began more than six months ago may drag on for many more weeks. Secretary of State Acheson is understood to have told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee recently that the number of concessions made by the Communists to date gives some basis for hope that they will be reasonable on pending issues.

KAESONG BOMB INCIDENT ACCIDENT, ALLIES SAY

PANMUNJON, Korea.—(AP)—The U.N. Command today said its planes bombed part of the Kaesong neutral zone last Thursday and also probably strafed a Communist truck convoy Friday. The U.N. Command blamed the Kaesong incident on the accidental release of a bomb instead of a winging gasoline tank. It said the pilot was trying to lighten his plane. The command said the bomb, a 1,000-pound, hurt no one and caused no property damage. In the other incident, a spokesman said that evidence indicated U.N. planes strafed a Red truck convoy twenty miles north of Kaesong last Friday. But he repeated an earlier Allied charge that the Reds appear to be taking advantage of special markings guaranteeing immunity during an armistice, but dropped that.

DRY CLIMATES HEALTHY?

Man Questioned In Karpe Death

BERNE, Switzerland.—(AP)—Swiss Federal police said today they are holding a man, believed to be a Romanian, in connection with the mysterious death of Capt. Eugene Karpe, former U. S. military attaché in Bucharest. Karpe fell or was pushed from a train in Austria Feb. 24, 1950. The death of the Marine Corps officer, a close friend of Robert Vogerler, U. S. businessman impugned by Hungary and released three years in the Bucharest diplomatic post. Vogerler believes Karpe's death was connected with his own case. Karpe's mangled body was found by a truck driver in a tunnel south of Salzburg in the American zone of Austria. His briefcase, believed to contain important papers, was missing.
