Undoubledly the defepse program can be trimmed somewhat. Original goals set in the tense atmosphere of the Korean War may be higher than necessary. And there are many places in the defense establishment where great savings can be made without serificing real combat strength.

Even so, a pruning of defense and foreign sid spending must be done cautiously lest the armed services be so crippled that they have been been been been been and the services of the security. Millions can be assed in monde-fense expenditures if Congress has ghe cour-age to followed the leadership of men like Senators Paul Douglas and Harry F. Byrd. In any drive for economy, non-defense spending must be given top priority. And in no event, must we yield to the temptation to use straw and sticks in our security struc-ture where brick and mortar are needed.
