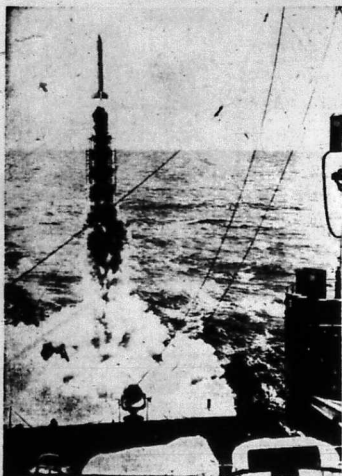


LAUNCHING THE LOON

Mass Break Of Red Prisoners Foiled

CHEJU ISLAND, Korea.—(AP)—Yesterday's rioting on this prisoner of war island was only a prelude to a planned mass escape of 5,384 Chinese, Red, American and British captives today.

May Gen. Thomas W. Herren told correspondents the riot was to be a signal for a mass breakout but U. S. troops moved in and "broke the back of the planned revolt."

Fifteen of the rioting prisoners were killed or fatally wounded. More than 100 others were injured.

Herren pointed out that the breakout was planned for October 1, the third anniversary of the founding of the Chinese Communist regime.

Col. Richard D. Boehm, Ontario, Calif., commander of the Cheju POW camp, said POW command headquarters learned of the planned break last Aug. 24th and immediately began making plans to foil it.

Boehm said he had told the troops not to shoot unless attacked. The soldiers stormed into the compound and the defiant Chinese from behind walls and from out of buildings and trenches.

Train Engine Catches Fire

NEW YORK.—(AP)—The engine of a crowded Pennsylvania Railroad commuter train caught fire in a tunnel under the Hudson River today, forcing hundreds of commuters were made ill by acrid smoke that billowed through the tube.

Smoke billowed through the three-mile tunnel, so thick that many of the commuters had to be assisted through the tunnel by a disabled train that had been pushed to New York.

Stalin Sees War Among Capitalists

MOSCOW.—(AP)—Prime Minister Stalin said today a war between capitalist countries is more probable than a war between capitalist and socialist (i. e., Communist) countries.

Stalin said war between the capitalist nations of the world are inevitable.

The Soviet leader made these statements in a 50-page article in the Communist Party magazine "Bolshevik" on the eve of the Communist Party Congress, opening next Sunday.

In expressing his views, Stalin said he was correcting the mistakes of other Communists who believed there was little likelihood of conflicts between capitalist countries, as they stated it, had subjected them to satellite positions.

The article by Stalin bore the title "Economic Problems of Socialism in the USSR." The title in line with the party view that the Soviet Union is in socialist state development, aiming toward the ultimate goal of communism.
