Adlai Charges Ike Is Confused

EN ROUTE WITH STEVENSON IN INDIANA (AP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson charged today that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is "completely confused about foreign policy."
The Democratic presidential nominee brought his whistle stop campaign to Indiana to declare, in an address prepared for delivery at Notre Dame University, that "the quackery of medicine men who claim to cure the disease with words of hate and loud accusations" will never banish communism from America.
"We haven't the slightest idea what position the Republican candidate would take on foreign policy if he were elected president," the Illinois Governor told a cheering crowd of 5,000 persons in South Bend. "We don't know whether the

Coal Strike May Extend Past Date Of Election

WASHINGTON (AP)—A long coal strike—possibly extending past the presidential election—seemed in store today with John L. Lewis insisting his miners get all the pay raises they negotiated with mine owners.
Lewis appears to have returned down a dead-end by saying a bitter verbal barrage at WSB members and other stabilization officials.
Lewis said the WSB action was an "atempted thievery" of milk money from miners' babies.
There seemed no way out of the impasse.
All this posed a problem for the Democratic Administration in the home-stretch of the Presidential campaign. It is generally considered bad politics to have a big strike in progress at election time.

Charges Gen. Ike Loose With Truth

(AP)—President Truman said today the Taft-Hartley law is supported by Republicans and "Dixiecrats and Shivercrats."
He didn't explain or identify "Shivercrats," but apparently was referring to Texas' Democratic Gov. Allen Shivers who has announced he is supporting Republican nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower for the Presidency.
Truman made the statement in his second talk of a campaign speech that began bright and early for him as usual, in the hard coal region of Northeastern Pennsylvania. It is a region where labor especially the United Mine Workers, long has been a big factor. And for his themes the President picked two subjects long head lined by the law, the Taft-Hartley Law and social security.
At Scranton, Truman took a swipe at Eisenhower whom he said is "taking extreme liberties with the truth" in describing social security as a "bipartisan" issue. Eisenhower, the President said, is singing the old Republican song intended to beguile the voters and addle their brains, and cause them to go crashing on the rocks of Republican victory in the election.
BLASTS LABOR LAW
And a nearby Wilkes-Barre, where members of UMW local 244 and the CIO United Steelworkers were out in force among the crowd of thousands in the public square, Truman argued that Republicans favor "that awful Taft-Hartley law" which will get control of the country they will try to "drive the working man back into slavery."
The speech was made in the home county of Pennsylvania's Republican Gov. John S. Fine, a scolding with Republican leaders hope will turn up a big majority for Eisenhower on Nov. 4. Truman in his campaign tour is seeking to change that, in swing Pennsylvania's 22 electoral votes to the Democratic nominee, Adlai Stevenson.
Hundreds of early risers greeted the President at the Wilkes-Barre train station. He was met by a crowd of thousands, many waving the American flag, and hundreds more waved as the motorcade rolled past on the road to Scranton, a Democratic center in neighboring Lackawanna County.

South Koreans Retake Height

SEOUL (AP)—South Korean soldiers, scoring a deadly rain of Communist mortar shells, recaptured the bloody crest of Sniper Hill today in a fierce battle with Chinese Reds.
They battled back to the top of the central Front hill nine hours after being chased off by about 1,500 Chinese.
Then, in a final charge, the ROK troops poured over the top and drove the Chinese back with showers of hand grenades.

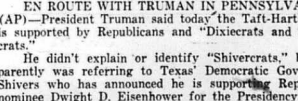

May Acquitted Of Contempt

WASHINGTON (AP)—George F. May, Chicago business man, was acquitted today of contempt of Congress charges.
Federal Judge Bernia S. Matthews, who heard the case without a jury, ruled that May was within his constitutional rights in refusing to answer questions from the Senate crime investigating committee that possibly could involve him in some federal prosecution.
May, 42, business engineer and promoter of the Tam O'Shanter Country Club's big money golf tournaments, went openly upon hearing the verdict.
May appeared before the crime investigating committee May 28, 1951. He was asked many questions about the operation of his country club and the Tam O'Shanter Club, and refused to answer them.
He also refused to say whether he knew Eddie Vogel, described as a slot machine king of Cook County, or other persons who have been linked with the Chicago underworld.

DODGES CONTROVERSIAL QUESTIONS

Alert to turn any unexpected breaks into vote-winning gains, the GOP leaders grabbed a 57-minute plane-transfer period out of the busy day and made the most of it.

U. S. Casualties Total 122,117

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department today announced the highest weekly U. S. casualty toll in the Korean War since the week ended last Friday was 963.
This raised the total U. S. casualties in the Korean fighting to 122,117.
In the previous highest week, more than three months ago, the total U. S. casualties were 985.
The department's weekly report showed that 47 servicemen and 15 children died in action last week, bringing the total number of American killed in the fighting to 13,184. There were 734 wounded and 38 missing last week, making respective totals of 90,114 and 12,819.

Harlem Group Hears Speech By Eisenhower



General Launches New England Drive

EN ROUTE WITH EISENHOWER (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower carried his near-daily drive for the presidency into Negro Harlem for the first time in his campaign today.
Addressing more than 250 Harlem civic leaders and 250 members of a church group at a breakfast gathering here, the President said the GOP candidate declared:
"I do not intend to bring before you or before America an evil tongue. An evil tongue is found only in disappointed men. I'm no medicine man. I don't have all the answers."
Eisenhower said that "We must make our Constitution live or our form of government makes no sense."
CITES PURPOSE
"Stating that the basic purpose of America is to provide a home for those people who love freedom more than anything else," the general added.
"We must always realize that there is a connection between a deeply felt faith in America and in God who is made the image of his man."
The aim of the Republican Party, he said, was to "make the United States shine brighter before the eyes of the world."
