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Floats, Beauties To Feature Parade

The sixth annual Carolinas Carrousel will end today after a slow marching parade on Tryon St. and a fast-stepping street square dance.

The parade, scheduled to begin at 5:30 P. M. at the corner of East and South Blvd., will climax the two days of festivities that started yesterday with the early afternoon arrival of 35 Carrousel princesses.

Over 140 separate units in the parade will assemble after the football game at Memorial Stadium. The game between Harding and Reidsville Schools will decide the Class AA championship.

Floats sponsored by firms in Charlotte and the two Carolinas, Santa Claus, clowns, mounted units, princesses riding in convertibles, Carrousel officials, celebrities—Earl Wilson and his family and Hopalong Cassidy—the Queen of the Carrousel, Miss Sue Covington of Bennettsville, S. C., the Queen of Song, Miss Betty Johnson, Miss North Carolina, Miss South Carolina and specially featured will be included.

Princesses from the 35 Carolina cities will be entertained immediately after the parade at a buffet supper, when the new Queen, who will reign over the Carrousel in 1953, will be crowned.
