WHO ELECTED IKE, AND WHY

WE HAVE previously defined the independent voter as "a free agent in politics," a person who does not hesitate to split his ballot, no matter what his primary registration.

President Truman was repudiated, but many of his faithful followers were not. For almost every "radical" who was defeated you can find a "reactionary" who, despite General Eisenhower's helpful presence on the ballot, was defeated.

In New Jersey, Minnesota, Michigan and Massachusetts the Democrats lost no House seats and in fact picked up a Senate seat in Massachusetts, despite Eisenhower's majority of about 13-10 in each state.

Kansas went Republican, by more than two to one, but its previously solid Republican Congressional delegation now includes a Democrat.

In Montana, Washington and Missouri three liberal Democrats, Congressmen Mike Mansfield and Henry Jackson and Stuart Symington, won Senate seats from isolationists Ecton, Cain and Ken, although all three states went Republican for the first time since 1928.

Illinois went overwhelmingly for Eisenhower, yet the Democrats picked up a House seat. And they lost but one in Indiana.

Senator Taft, the other night on TV, tried to claim a gaudy share of Mr. Republican victory. Poppycock. Even his brother, well-reputed in his own right, could not win the Ohio governorship from the incumbent Lausche, despite Eisenhower's 43 victory in that state.

These nation-wide results are clearly in line with the middle-of-the-road philosophy of President-Elect Eisenhower. They afford no substance for the claims of the Old Guard Republicans that the voters have repudiated the many Democratic accomplishments of the past 20 years.

Continuation of such a program will mean a continued moderate price rise—say two or three per cent a year. That, he believes, can cause considerable injustice, particularly in the insurance and pension plans. But he says there's an answer to that—investment in stocks and real estate, where values move up as prices rise.

Meanwhile, the gains to the country in maintenance of high employment and high living standards, made possible by the rising prices, will partially offset the injustices.

This is an interesting answer. It reminds us of the financial philosophy of an old Armenian friend who, like most of his kindmen, made the moola.

He kept one-third of his money in "solid" investments, one-third in "risk" investments, and kept the other third around just in case a good deal came along.

But now we would like to know how to come out each month with just a little surplus to invest in the solids, risks and good deals.
