## FIVE BUSY MONTHS ON CAPITOL HILL

ALTHOUGH Congress convenes Jan. 3, it will do little serious business before February. Congressmen will get settled first few weeks, then look at the budget and listen to Fresident-elect Eisenhower, after he takes office Jan. 20.

After Congress digs In, it will consider many major problems whose solution has no statutory time limit, as well as emergency situations which arise. But during those first five months of real work, from Feb. 1 to July f. scores of laws will terminate, because previous Congresses wrote terminal dates into them. Here are the subject matters of 14 of the most important ones, and their dates of expiration.

"MARCH 30.—Reorganization Act of 1949, which provides that no Presidential reorganization plan is to take effect unless the President submits it to Congress by April 1.

APRIL 1.—President's authority to order precedence for transportation of troops and war materials over all other traffic in time of emergency.
