SENATOR IVES HIT UP FOR RUSSIAN RFC ACTION

Banking Committee 'Kicked Around' On Appointment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Ives (R-N.Y.) today accused President Truman of having "kicked around and coerced" the Senate Banking Committee in an attempt to win Senate confirmation of Harry A. McDonald as head of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Ives said Mr. Truman acted "in a contemptuous manner."

Ives said, for those reasons, he said he has decided to vote against confirmation of McDonald, now head of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Ives expressed his views in a statement in the giving of his ready to call up the disputed nomination.

There was some possibility a vote on the appointment might be detracted by a move to abolish the RFC.

MAY SIDETRACK VOTE

"My reason for opposing this nomination," Ives said, "is the unseemly and contemptuous manner in which, it seems to me, the Banking Committee on Banking and Finance has been handled by the chief executive in his determination to force the committee to do his bidding in this particular situation."

"I would take the same position were the chief executive a member of my own party."

"The 'or else' to which I refer would appear to be the President's intention that he himself would run the Reconstruction Finance Corporation by personal administrative direction."

"I am not quite clear about how this phenomenon actually would be achieved. I feel sure, however, that neither the law nor the Congress ever contemplated action so extraordinary on the part of the chief executive."

McDonald is a Republican.

APPROVED BY GROUP

The Senate Banking Committee, headed by Sen. May (D-S.C.), approved nomination 73 last week after having kept the appointment up for weeks.

The committee refused to consider the nomination while the SEC was under investigation by a House subcommittee. Some members of the Senate group said the White House showed a lack of common sense in pushing McDonald to the RFC while the House subcommittee reported it found no indication of wrongdoing by McDonald.

Earlier, Mr. Truman had refused to withdraw the nomination, which the Senate Banking Committee members who conferred with the President said he indicated he would run the RFC himself.

Ives said that he wanted to emphasize "that my position vote will reflect my view of Mr. McDonald's integrity or other qualifications for the position in question."

Most NC Congressmen Say It's Taft-Truman

A Taft-Truman race for the Presidency appears likely to a majority of the Tar Heel Congressional delegation.

Eight North Carolina Representatives interviewed in Washington expressed unanimous agreement that Sen. Robert Taft will be the Republican nominee.

Most of them thought President Harry Truman as the probable Democratic nominee.

Gov. Adam Stevenson of Illinois was most often mentioned as the Democratic nominee if Truman doesn't run.

Those who ventured an opinion as to the winner of a Taft-Truman race said quite naturally for Democrats—but Truman will be the winner.

Several of them seemed pleased by the prospects that Senator Taft will oppose their Party leader.

SHOULD INFORM FRIENDS

"Truman will get it if he wants it," said Rep. Robert Doughton of Laurel Springs (Ninth District), "but it seems he should let his friends know his plans now."

"It looks like Taft has the Republican lead now," he continued, "but all these dark horses might double back on him."

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Those of those to be questioned is being worked out with the Civil Service Commission.

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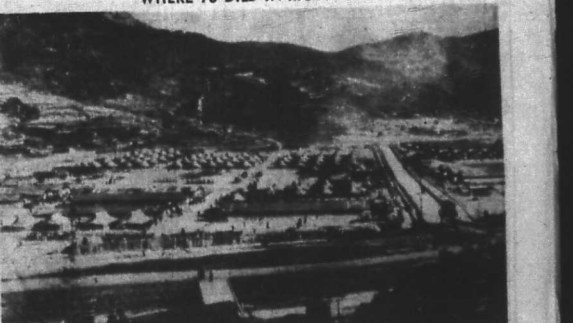

UN Seeks To Break Deadlock

MUNICH, Korea (AP)—U. N. truce negotiators moved to break the deadlock over selection of a neutral truce supervisory commission today by offering to withdraw their nomination of Norway if the Reds would give up Russia.

ON TRUCE COMMISSION

Under the Allied proposal to break the deadlock during an armistice would be made by representatives of only two neutral nations for each side rather than three.

The U. N. would be represented by Switzerland and Sweden, and Poland.

The only immediate reaction came from Chinese Col. Pu Shun-chi declared: "You have no justification to object to the nations nominated by our side which are in compliance with the definition of neutral nations."

ON TRUCE COMMISSION

S. A. officers working on prisoner exchange made no headway during 36-minute session, Col. George W. Hickman called it a "completely fruitless" meeting.

The Communists complained that four Allied aircraft flew over the neutral Panmunjom conference area during the night.

"It appears that your side has taken no action to restrict your aircraft," said Col. Tsai Cheng.

Col. Andrew J. Kinney told Tsai: "We note your statement. We will take it up later after we get the facts."

ON TRUCE COMMISSION

In addition to proposing a compromise supervisory commission plan, Allied staff officers submitted a re-phrased paragraph covering verification of armistice and replacement of a truce.

It provided that neutral teams would be permitted to check equipment enough to "properly insure" that it was of the same type being replaced.

The plan specified that "this shall not be construed as authorizing inspections or examinations of any secret designs or characteristics of any combat aircraft, armored vehicles, weapons and ammunition."

ON TRUCE COMMISSION

The Reds, who advocate a more thorough inspection, replied only: "We have fully expressed our views on this matter."

The staff officers made no progress toward agreeing on the number of ports of entry to be checked each side.

There was no mention in the prisoner exchange negotiations of the candidates for the Presidential nomination.
