#### PRESIDENTIAL RACE WARMS UP

The Presidential nomination has gathered steam today from the heat of angry name-calling between candidates.

Unrestrained word-fighting that led herebefore to a campaign in Nebraska between Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee and Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, now is seeking delegates in next Tuesday's Democratic preference race.

Kerr's Nebraska campaign manager, Bernard A. Boyle, said that Kerr had supported Smith. He said the rumors about Kerr were "a last minute vicious campaign."

Kefauver denied he raised the religious issue and said Kerr should answer about the campaign.

### Farm Groups Differ On Foreign Aid Cut

WASHINGTON (AP)—One national farm organization urged a \$1,000,000 cut today in President Truman's \$7,900,000 foreign aid program, but another suggested each would be limited to 10 minutes of direct testimony, not counting questions.

"Failure to make international loans available to developing countries will be a refusal to do all we can to help international Communism get its foot on our necks."

### Negotiator Says Truce Delayed 'Just To Argue'

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—An Allied truce negotiator said today the Communists appear to be unnecessarily holding up the armistice just to argue.

The Russian question and the problem of how to exchange prisoners of war are the two primary current obstacles to an armistice. Another group of staff officers met in secret session for the fourth time Friday in an effort to break the deadlock over whether prisoners should be allowed to reject repatriation.

### Vatican Envoy Ban Adopted

WASHINGTON (AP)—An amendment aimed at blocking the dispatch of any U. S. diplomatic missions to Vatican City without congressional sanction was written into the "armistice" bill today by the House Appropriations Committee.

The amendment was adopted by a vote of 19 to 17, with three members recorded as "present," at a session of the House today.

The amendment prohibits the State Department from sending any "foreign service post or mission, exclusive of consular posts, in any state or country prior to or confirmation by the United States to Vatican City, seat of the Catholic Church. ### 2ND ADENAUER 'BOMB' IS JUST AN OLD CLOCK

BONN, Germany (AP)—A second exploded bomb attempt on the life of Chancellor Adenauer within 24 hours proved a false alarm late today. Federal police gingerly opened a suspicious parcel and found inside a loudly-ticking antique clock.

Police and populace were jittery after the package addressed to Dr. Adenauer exploded last night at Munich, killing one man and injuring four others. Police sealed all parcels addressed to the 76-year-old chancellor and were especially watchful for Munich packages. The package containing the clock was mailed from Munich. Adenauer is a collector of antique clocks.

Two other packages covered by the police here this evening also contained "harmless gifts." Nevertheless, Dr. Adenauer was given unprecedented police protection as a spokesman for the Ministry of Interior said there were indications further attempts to kill him could be expected.

A huge manhunt is under way in West Germany for an unidentified man sought in connection with the Munich blast.
