In his New Hampshire campaign he did espouse most of the Truman program, both foreign and domestic, emphasizing the need for new and conscientious administrators. His "apology" to Governor Stevenson reflected a recognition of primary defects which other candidates don't mention—except when they lose.

If he does attain the nomination, however, his reputation for independence, and against crime and corruption, will produce votes among citizens who prefer the Democratic Party but will abandon it if its standards of administration aren't raised.
