OIL STRIKE CONTINUES GASOLINE SHORT IN SOME AREAS

DENVER (U.P.)—The nation-wide strike of nearly 90,000 unionized oil industry workmen went into its second day today with shortages of gasoline for motorists already reported in scattered areas.

Some filling stations in the steel-producing area of Gary, Hammond and East Chicago, Ind., reported they were out of gasoline last night, less than 24 hours after the strike began. Other stations were expected to run out today. Similar shortages were cropping up elsewhere in the Midwest.

In Washington, Government officials said shortages must be expected if the strike is prolonged. They estimated the national shortage at 45-day supply of gasoline and said reduction of current supplies would mean a nationwide shortage of major proportions. Industry spokesmen had said earlier the gasoline stocks were at an all-time high and the strike might cause spot shortages in the near future, not 10 days' supply in inventory.

Sawyer Says No Early Increase Planned

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The U. S. Court of Appeals by a 5 to 4 vote refused today to bar the government from raising wages of steel workers while it holds the seized mills.

The judge denying a plea from major steel companies that the court enjoin Secretary of Commerce Sawyer from doing anything about wages and working conditions was the same as that by which the court last night returned the steel plants to government control. Only a few minutes before the court decision was announced, Sawyer had said in a statement he did not intend to take any "precipitate" action about wages.

GOVERNMENT ORDERS Oil Inventory Curbs

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—The government slapped inventory restrictions on some major petroleum products in 17 Eastern states and the District of Columbia today as a result of the strike by CIO oil workers.

The action was taken by the Petroleum Administration for Defense (PAD). Its order prohibits deliveries in the 17 states and the District of Columbia of automotive gasoline, kerosene, home heating oil, diesel fuel, and residual fuel oil to retail and large-volume consumers.

CONGRESS PONDS ACTION Tak Of Impeachment Mounts

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Impeachment talk grew louder on Capitol Hill today as Congress considered giving itself power to halt strikes by injunction.

The House Armed Services Committee scheduled a hearing starting probably next Tuesday on a new anti-strike bill which could block strikes indefinitely in emergency periods.

Cotton, Textile Controls Likely To End Next Week
