A primary tim of the Marshall Plan was to enable Europe to pay its own way. We parficu-arly urged Europe to sell for dollars, which are scarce most places except in the U. S.

Under the reciprocal trade agreement's scape clause the Tariff Commission is uthorized to raise duties if it finds that the omestic manufacturer has been seriously jured by competition. FOR NEARLY 50 years, North Carolina's Dr. Hugh H. Bennett championed soil conservation from his high post in the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Now he has retired to a well-earned rest.

When the records of U. S. twentieth cen-tury history are all in, Dr. Bennett's con-tribution may well rank alongside those of men of greater public acclaim. He was one of the Sigst to recognize that the vast soil resources of this great continent were not un-limited, that a steadily increasing population and a growing industrial base demanded intel-ligent care and use of the soil. And he foresaw more clearly than others that depletion of forests, overgrazing of pasture land, and careless farming practices would destroy the rain-absorbing cover of the earth, leaving it open to rain and wind crosion and endanger-ing cities built along the banks of flooding rivers.

Elsewhere on foday's editorial page is a rpport from the new nation of Israel on what is being done there by another great American conservationist, Dr. W. C. Lowdermilk, to reclaim barren, wasted soil and make it productive once again. In Israel, the job is one of reclamation. In the United States, fortunately, it is still a task of conservation. Much needs to be done if the nation is to avoid the fate predicted in Dr. Lowdermilk's which is the swatching of the land, the fruitful fields shall become sterile, stony ground or wasting guilles and thy descendants shall
