In a statement, he protested that he asked for a strengthened law but Congress "moved in the other direction" and enacted one which "weakens our ability to hold down prices and stabilize our economy."

Senate Okays \$46 Billion Defense Fund

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate last night approved a \$46,000,000,000 budget for the armed forces for the fiscal year starting today, nearly five billion dollars less than President Truman asked. The measure, the largest money bill before Congress this year, carries a provision Sen. O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.) said assured the Air Force is a little over 50 wings.

CHANGES ARE GOOD

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Opposes Democratic Civil Rights Stand

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina, scoffing at what a "sugar coated" civil rights platform, said today his state might go Republican in November if the Democratic Presidential candidate is unacceptable. He left the inference at a news conference that other states of the traditionally Democratic South might split away from their party or even vote for some third candidate.

Byrnes, a former secretary of state, Illinois Supreme Court justice, indicated that Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois is a possible "draft" candidate. He would not be acceptable because of his position on civil rights. Stevenson said yesterday he favored letting the individual states retain their own legislative practices act, but that he favored compulsory legislation if they failed to do so. Byrnes said such a proposal "sugar coating."

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
