Fliers Set Jet Kill Record

By MILO FARNETI... Seoul, Korea (U-P) - Five Sabre jets today blasted four Red MIG-15s out of North Korean skies and raised to a record 48 the number of Communist warplanes destroyed in one month, the U. S. Fifth Air Force said.

The four destruction claims, plus confirmation of a Sept. 4 kill, pushed September's figure past the previous high of 44, set in April. The April figure included 41 MIGs destroyed in air combat and three propeller-driven fighters caught on the ground.

LONDON (U-P)—Winifred Haggerty, blonde, beautiful and 21, could not make up her mind whether to marry Leslie Hook, who worked in the same office, or laborer William Brooks. She pondered for months. Finally Brooks acted. He stormed into Winifred's office, swung her around by the hair, and beat up his rival, fracturing Hook's skull. He eventually was carried off to jail after a fight with three policemen. The fracas got Brooks 21 months in jail—and made up Winifred's mind for her. As soon as Brooks left the courtroom to begin his sentence, she announced that he was the winner. "He has shown he loves me even if he showed it the wrong way," she declared. Of the defeated Hook, Winifred said, "he made no attempt to get in touch with me since he came out of the hospital. I don't want a man who doesn't want me."

ASKS 'CONSISTENT' PROGRAM

Ike Makes Bid For Votes Of Farmers

By JACK BELL... ABOARD EISENHOWER SPECIAL.—(AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower carried his campaign into politically-vital Minnesota today with a call for a "consistent" farm program. Speaking before a crowd estimated at almost 3,000 persons at Elberton, Minn., the Republican presidential nominee accused the Democrats of putting the farmer "in the middle" by conflicting price control and agricultural aid programs. Cheered by his crowd-packed reception in 13 appearances in Illinois and Indiana yesterday, Eisenhower swung hard against the Democratic domestic and foreign programs. He said that farmers were "caught in the middle" that fall when the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) threatened to clamp price controls on hogs at the same time the Agriculture Department was saying that the over-supply of hogs would prevent any price increases. "As for the Republicans, we will be consistent," Eisenhower said. "Having made a farm program, we will not back and fill."

Adlai To Visit Washington Over Week-End

Candidate May Confer With Truman... By BELMAN MORIN... SPRINGFIELD, Ill.—(U-P)—Gov. Adlai Stevenson is scheduled to visit Washington Saturday, his headquarters announced today, and speculation arose about another meeting between the Democratic Presidential candidate and President Truman. Stevenson opens a second campaign tour, covering the Atlantic seaboard Thursday. An aide disclosed today that the governor will arrive in Washington by air at approximately 10 A. M. (EST) Saturday, en route to the Marine Corps Base at Quantico, Va. His son, Adlai III, is in officers training school there. Stevenson will make what was described as a "non-campaign talk" at the Marine Base and go on to Richmond, Va., for a speech there Saturday night. Stevenson had exchanged several telephone calls with Truman and found a letter from the President waiting for him when he returned from his recent Western trip. "The governor's itinerary leaves next Sunday a blank. It is his custom to make speeches on Sundays and observers suggested he might take the opportunity to confer with Truman before his New York for a speech before the American Federation of Labor Convention Monday. He last saw the President Aug. 12, in Washington.

U. S. Population Now Put At 157,269,000

WASHINGTON.—The population of the United States stood at 157,269,000 on Aug. 1, the Bureau of the Census reported today. This represents an increase of 254,000 over July 1. The 1950 census listed U. S. population at 151,192,000. Thus the population has increased 6,137,000 in little over two years.

Truman Message To AFL Convention

WASHINGTON.—President Truman's appointment of the Democrats to the AFL plans to endorse a presidential candidate. This morning, a lengthy resolution to give the endorsement to Stevenson was introduced into a committee on resolutions. The three-page Truman message said that things will be followed by and large, we have beaten back the main attacks and we have made real progress. I do not know what things will be like in the future, but I am sure that they will be determined largely by the result of the election this year.

Seventy-two persons were arrested by Mecklenburg County ABC law enforcement officers last night and early today in one of the largest raids against bootlegging since the war. Henry C. Truman Raps Foes Of Health Insurance

By ERNEST B. VACCARO... PHILADELPHIA (U-P)—President Truman today described opponents of national medical insurance as "pullbacks" who want to "go back to the horse and buggy days." The President declared it is a job for all of us to bring medical and health services to the people at a price they can afford to pay. "I would not call such a goal socialism," Truman said. "I would call it a goal of enterprise—American enterprise." Truman didn't mention the Republican presidential nominee by name in a speech prepared for a luncheon of the American Hospital Association in Convention Hall. But he quoted language used by Eisenhower in New York Sunday opposing Truman's medical insurance plan. Eisenhower advocated, among other steps, "locally administered indigent medical care programs."

Six Marine Fliers Killed

WASHINGTON.—The Marine Corps reported today that six fighter pilots flew into a cloud-shrouded hillside in Korea last Thursday and were killed. An announcement said the pilots, flying Panther jets, were returning from a combat mission in bad weather and were trying to approach a strange landing field. No further details were given. On return flights from combat missions, pilots frequently fly in (follow-the-leader) order. This may have been the case with the six. All of the pilots were members of the "Able Eagles" Squadron. The lead pilot was 2nd Lt. John W. Hill Jr., 25, husband of Mrs. Betty Hill and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hill Sr., Moncks Corners, S. C.
