Government and, in the abstract, it is supported by a majority of those Americans who have stopped to think about it. But principle and practice sometimes come into conflict. It did so last week.

Although the "package deal" smacks of Russian blackmail, it is not, in itself, inconsistent with past U. S. policy, so long as the policy is to admit all qualified nations. But the U. S. quite properly refused to consider any such proposition so long as Japan and South Korea were excluded.
