Grand Jury Probe Of Surrender To Reporter Is Set In Chicago
 CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP) — Federal Judge Charles G. Briggs has set Sept. 8th for a federal grand jury probe into Robert L. Kneizer's surrender to Chicago Herald-American reporter Leroy (Buddy) McHugh.

McHugh tracked down the ex-car dealer in an Omaha hotel room last July after Kneizer had escaped from a Springfield jail.
 The reporter testified today that Kneizer had told him of paying \$139,750 to former U. S. Marshal Robert Grant "for the privilege of being in and out of jail" and that \$84,750 of that was for Grant while the rest was to take care of "other officials."

Judge Bringle questioned McHugh as to what proof he had to back up Kneizer's statements and charged McHugh with printing "sensational stories" without verifying facts.
 When told by the judge that an FBI office was located across the street from Kneizer's hotel room in Omaha, McHugh replied he had acted on instructions from his managing editor in taking Kneizer to Milwaukee before the fugitive was surrendered to federal authorities.
