Filipinos Ready To Cast Votes

MANILA (U-P)—President Elpidio Quirino and challenger Ramon Magasaysay wrapped up their free-swinging campaigns tonight and left it to the voters to decide tomorrow who will be the new chief executive of the Philippines.

Despite military precautions, violence grew in the last ten hours before the polls opened.

Both sides claimed victory—the incumbent Liberal Party by 400,000 votes and the opposition Nationalist-Communist Party coalition by a million to 1½ million votes.

The election board said definite results probably would not be known for three days.

The angry, hot-blooded campaign ended in Manila with both candidates home from quick, last-minute trips to the outlying districts.

Quirino returned from the north for a last pre-election broadcast and a rally.

Magasaysay flew back from the south for rallies.

PARADES HELD

From throughout Manila torchlight flickered in the humid night as parades from various districts converged in the downtown area.

In his prepared radio speech, President Quirino again stressed his charge of American intervention in the election—the issue on which he has based his campaign.

Woman Accused Of Kidnapping: Baby Safe

Ex-Carnival Dancer Held For Abduction

Says She Took Child To Replace Her Own

HUGO, Okla. (U-P)—A 17-year-old former carnival strip dancer was arrested today and quickly arraigned on a federal charge of kidnapping a 5-month-old baby boy while baby sitting with him at Evansville, Ind.

FBI agents arrested Mrs. Tommie Dene Doughty and recovered the baby, Richard Lee Stammer, from a "chance" meeting.

They were found at the home of Mrs. Doughty's father, Buford M. Doughty, North of Muskogee in Red River Valley farm country.

Mrs. Doughty was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner D. A. Stovall six hours after she was captured. Stovall placed her under \$20,000 bond and she was turned over to U. S. Deputy Marshal W. A. White for removal to Muskogee federal jail.

GLAD IT'S OVER

"In a way I'm glad it's over, but I still wish I could have kept him for a few more days," Mrs. Doughty told The Associated Press in Oklahoma City by telephone.

He didn't give me any trouble at all during the trip.

She was permitted to talk on the phone after her arraignment and she happily answered questions about her trip by bus and hitchhiking since she took the baby Friday night.

"He is just the age of the one I lost," Mrs. Doughty said. "I fell in love with him when I first saw him. He reminded me of my child."

"I had some money when we left Evansville and I bought what he needed along the way. He didn't cry at all. . . . Was just a perfect baby."

The child is the son of Richard Duane Stammer, 29, a sailor, and Shirley Stammer, 18.

LOST CHILD

"How would you feel?"

The FBI said that Mrs. Doughty lost a child at birth in June 1953 in Chicago.

The agents said that Mrs. Doughty told them she gave birth to a child at Dallas in 1951 but two weeks later her husband took it away and she never has seen it since. The FBI said the father was Lamar Mitchell.

The Stammer baby apparently suffered no ill effects from the two days' disorientation of travel.

A physician checked the baby at Durant and said he was in perfect physical condition.

The FBI said Mrs. Doughty told her parents the baby was hers. At her arraignment, Mrs. Doughty said she was a 17-year-old girl.

U. S. Declares Disarmament Up To Russia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U-P)—The United States today called for a total disarmament and world peace depend on a "change" in mind and attitude by Russia's rulers.

In a major policy speech prepared for the U. N. Assembly, 60-nation political committee, Secretary of State George Marshall said:

"The fighting in Korea obviously has made disarmament talk unrealistic. But now we have an armistice, and the United States continues, therefore to hope that despite the discouraging nature of the Soviet note of Nov. 3 in connection with a four-power conference in Germany, the Soviet leaders will yet give concrete indications that they actively desire to remedy the current state of international affairs."

"We hope they will join with us in practical steps to reduce international tension which will be reflected in developing a disarmament program."

"Disarmament is impossible without international security and the major political issues have been achieved, disarmament cannot be conducted without proper safeguards."

MAJOR ISSUES

Lodge said no balanced disarmament program can be put into effect "until world tensions have been reduced by settlement of some of the major political issues between the Soviet Union and the free world."

But, he added, agreement on such a disarmament program would help ease the world tensions.

"The existence of international security depends on a change of mind and attitude on the part of the rulers of the Soviet Union."

"So long as they believe that they have the only good idea for conducting human affairs—which idea they must impose on the rest of the world either it likes it or not—and so long as they live in a state of mind that the rest of the world seeks to destroy their idea, just long will Communist imperialism continue in all its manifestations: subversion of peaceful governments by force and fraud."

RISING 'MOAT' IS CAUSE FOR EVACUATIONS

BALTIMORE (U-P)—Something of a moat developed on Castle St., and five families had to get out of their homes.

The trouble was a leaking sewer. It started some time ago and washed out a cavern 15 feet deep, 25 feet long and 25 feet wide before it was discovered.

M'Carthy Denounces Mitchell Challenge

WASHINGTON (U-P)—Democratic challenge to the Eisenhower administration to lay before a grand jury the charges that former President Truman promoted a Russian spy was termed "completely dishonest" today by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

WAK RIDGE, Tenn. (U-P)—A work stoppage by 6,500 AFL construction workers halted work today on a \$44 million atomic energy plant.

Picket lines were posted by local 51, Sheet Metal Workers, who struck Nov. 2 to back up demands for seven cents a mile travel pay from their homes to the project site.

Cotton Estimate Upped Nearly Half Million Bales

WASHINGTON (U-P)—The Agriculture Department, in a semi-final report of the year, today estimated this year's cotton crop at 10,693,000 bales and 957,000 above last year's weight.

This is 497,000 bales more than last month's forecast of 15,996,000 bales and 957,000 above last year's crop of 15,138,000 bales. It compares also with 12,215,000 bales for the 1952 (1953-54) average.

Because of declining exports and accumulation of surplus supplies, Secretary Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1954 crop designed to limit production to 10 million bales. Growers will vote on the quota at a referendum Dec. 15. Approval by at least two-thirds of these voters is required to make the controls operative.

In an accompanying report the Census Bureau said 10,767,521 bales of cotton from this year's crop had been ginned prior to Nov. 1 compared with 10,807,206 ginned to the same date last year and 10,692,000 two years ago.

The department estimated the yield of lint cotton averaged 35.4 pounds for each acre to be harvested. This compares with 28.7 pounds last year and 27.4 two years ago.

Under the 1954 production control program, the government will purchase 17,910,000 acres for planting compared with about 24½ million planted this year, unless Congress authorizes a larger allotment. Benson has said that the 17,910,000-acre allotment is the largest he can legally make under farm law, but he said he would urge Congress to make a "reasonable" increase.

The production of American-Egyptian type cotton was estimated at 68,500 bales compared with 65,000 last year and 27,200 for the ten-year average.

The individual yield per acre and production of cotton, respectively, by states included: North Carolina 290 and 400,000; South Carolina 317 and 719,000.

Production forecasts were 15,019 bales below a month ago for South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama.

The number of bales ginned to Nov. 1 this year compared with ginnings to the same date last year, respectively, by states included: North Carolina 416,881 and 401,840; South Carolina 651,078 and 540,653.

Greenlease Bill Reported Discovered In Michigan

DETROIT (U-P)—Twenty dollars of the missing \$308,000 Greenlease ransom money had appeared in Detroit, Mich., according to a copyrighted story by The Detroit Times today.

FBI agents have clamped a security lid on local police officers and all other persons involved in the trail of the money.

In Detroit, Fred McIntire, local FBI chief, declined comment.

The Detroit Times story said FBI agents have swarmed into Detroit since last Tuesday when the \$20 bill was discovered by Mrs. Henry J. Krauser, who operates a rooming house.

Mrs. Krauser identified the money from a list circulated by the FBI to all operators of hotels, motels, rooming houses and merchants.

The Detroit Times story said a number of bills discovered is a closely guarded secret.

There have been no arrests made in connection with the passing of the money.

Because of the security clamp, local police officials denied any knowledge of the situation. And the FBI in Washington and St. Louis declined comment on developments.
