ATOM BOMB SITE, Nev. — The little white houses on the corner of Elm and Main Streets today take a fearful pounding tomorrow.

Atomic Tests To Be Seen On TV

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Television coverage of tomorrow's atom bomb explosion will start at 8 A. M. Eastern Standard Time, and be on the air for half an hour.

Even the several hundred newsmen and civil defense observers at News Nob, seven miles south of the explosion point, are due for shock and heat about equal to that experienced at last Spring's invitational shot.
