Wider Judicial Lineup Offered In Both Houses

Bills Are Expansion Of Umstead Measure

RALEIGH — Legislation to realign the state's judicial districts as to give the state a total of 32 regular Superior Court judges was introduced in both houses of the Legislature today. Sen. Calvin Graves of Forsyth was joined by Sens. Hamilton Hobson of Franklin and Edwin Pate of Scotland in sponsoring the Senate bill. Reps. William F. Womble of Forsyth, Edward Yarborough of Franklin, W. E. Byrd of Beaufort and Carroll R. Holmes of Perquimans sponsored an identical House bill. They asserted in a statement the purpose of the legislation "is to assure... the most orderly growth of our judicial system and more efficient administration of justice."

Molotov And Beria Aides

LONDON — (A.P.) — Moscow Radio announced tonight Georgi M. Malenkov has been appointed Chairman (Prime Minister) of the Council of Ministers of the USSR. The Moscow Radio also announced that Marshal Kliment Voroshilov had been appointed Chairman of the Soviet Presidium in place of Nikolai Shvernik. This is equivalent to the Presidency of the Soviet Union. The broadcast added that I. P. Beria, V. M. Molotov, Nikolai Bulganin and Lazar M. Kaganovich have been appointed deputy chairmen of the Council of Ministers. Beria also was named Minister of the Interior while Molotov was named Minister of Foreign Affairs, the broadcast said. Andrei A. Vishinsky, who has been foreign minister, has been named the USSR's permanent U.N. representative, while Bulganin also was named Minister of War, the broadcast added. Top contender for the job last October when he was chosen to make the keynote speech before the Communist Party Congress. He has never been outside the Soviet Union. As Minister of Interior, Beria, undoubtedly will remain in charge of the dread secret police and the atomic energy program as he was under Stalin. Malenkov, who was Foreign Minister for years, now returns to the post.
