VIOLATION RULED NO BASIS FOR SUIT

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court decided today that a house owner may not be sued for violating a racial covenant.

The decision was an extension of a 1948 ruling by the high court that restrictive real estate covenants of that kind are legal on a voluntary basis but cannot be enforced in court.

CONVICTION OF BRIDGES VOIDED

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court today reversed the jury conviction of Harry Bridges.

The Australian-born Bridges was convicted of lying when he told a 1945 naturalization hearing that he was not a Communist.
