In trying to understand Bricker's stubborn opposition to the reasonable Knowland amendment, it must be recalled that the compromise does not include Bricker's controversial Section 3 which says:

"Congress shall have power to regulate all executive and other agreements with any other foreign power or international organization... This is the heart of the Bricker amendment. All the talk about undermining the Constitution is just so much window-dressing..."

President Eisenhower set himself squarely against this move. "I am unalterably opposed," he said, "to any amendment which would change our traditional treaty-making power or which would hamper the President in his constitutional authority to conduct foreign affairs..."

The President is profoundly right. The Knowland amendment answers the main demands of Senator Bricker, without hampering or weakening in any way the conduct of his sworn duties... However, Senator Hoy was the only Southerner to vote per cent "on-the-record" vote...

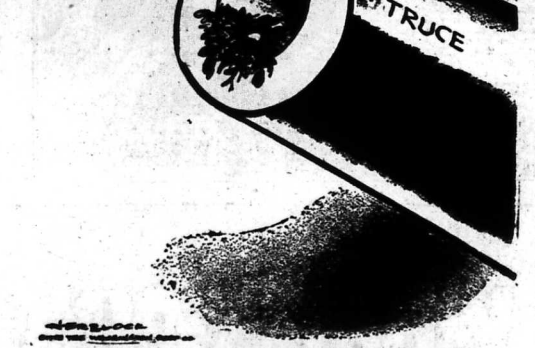
