Fay Geraldine Farrar Laughlin, former New York magazine cover girl and actress, presumed dead by an insurance company which paid a death claim after a seven-year search, made a dramatic entrance at Douglas Airport at 12:22 p.m. today and was greeted by her fearful mother, Mrs. J. M. Furr of Troy, whom she had not seen since 1927.
