Memorial Hospital Auxiliary Stages Benefit Luncheon And Fashion Show

We suppose that both the Charlotte Memorial Hospital Auxiliary and Ivey's are interested in the same basic thing—the body — although the approach may be somewhat different!

At any rate, the annual benefit fashion show presented by the two organizations today at luncheon at the Hotel Charlotte was a happy confluence of the two viewpoints for an important cause. And the ballroom of the hotel was filled with women who were interested either in the health of the body or the covering thereof — or, more probably, both.

Special arrangements were used on the individual tables, with many camellias and much ivy in evidence. A 40-foot runway covered in red carpeting extended from the stage out through the audience, so that visibility was good for all the spectators. The stage itself had a background of screens behind which was stretched pink silk, splashed with tiny green flowers. French flower carts holding potted azaleas in shades of pinks and reds centered the stage, flanked by pink French-type obelisks, seven feet tall, filled with red roses and lavender ferns.

The luncheon was theatrical and Clarence Eilers provided background organ music for the show.

EASTER PARADE
The fashions were divided in two parts by the expediency and the food. After the main course was served, the lights were dimmed, and Miss Blodine Morse of Ivey's presented the first course of the show — fashions for the Easter Parade.

The programs were printed in tangerine ink on beige paper, and one of the most striking Easter costumes presented followed the same subdued but exciting scheme. A beige cape costume was highlighted by a tangerine printed blouse, and worn with an exaggerated pipe hat of tangerine straw with a large brim.

Also in the 5th Ave. or Tryon St. mood was a pure silk dress in sage and lemon and black with a scoop neck, almost elbow-length sleeves (gaining importance) and piped in black. A huge red hat was most effective with this dress.

Ben Zuckerman's "paint brush tweed" suit in beige, slightly streaked with white, had an easy flair to the skirt, which was not only graceful but might also be prophetic. The jacket was bound in white cord and fastened with beautiful mother-of-pearl buttons.

DESSERT COURSE
Intermission interrupted the showing for awhile, the lights brightened, dessert was served, tables were cleared, and the second half of the fashion presentation took place.

In this group were day clothes, cottons, late afternoon fashions and, finally, a gorgeous array of formal.

Among the cottons was a supple dress of black and brown print with a jacket edged in cotton fringe, and worn with a really dramatic seashell-shaped hat of natural heavy straw, with a fishnet scarf hiding all the hair.

Ben Zuckerman's white fitted, faille coat was shown over a brown and blue print by Adele Simpson, both excellent examples of the white coat and the printed silk so important this spring and summer.

For richness of fabrics and delicateness of tones, the modified sheath of porcelain silk flat crepe, tiful white ballgown, one with a white fox portrait stole and the other with a white fox cape stole; leith with long gloves and handsome glitter jewelry.

Outstanding was a slim black crepe with black lace applied over the bustline. A flesh tulle fichu draped the shoulders in portrait effect, and the floor-length gown was beautifully fitted.

A shirred tulle gown by Modern Couture in gunmetal gray was fitted from bust to below the knee, with the tulle released in an exaggerated and provocative flounce. In contrast, the very new baby dress was shown, in a version made of row after row of Val lace, with a pink draped midriff. A white ermine clutch cape made this one seem somewhat grown up.

GRAND FINALE
For the finale Ivey's showed four very very elegant evening gowns, all with fox furs. One was a pink lace sheath with a white fox throw; another was a blue pure silk tissue tulle, beaded with crystal, rhinestone and pearl pendants, full but sophisticated, and shown with a platinum fox cape stole; and the last two were beau-

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Beet, Celery and Apple Molds
Dice one cup of celery, add 1 cup peeled, corrod diced apple and the same amount of cooked, peeled, and diced cold peas. Dissolve 1 package of lemon-flavored gelatin in one cup of warm beet water, add three tablespoons of wine vinegar, 1/4 cup of cold orange juice and season to taste with salt and pepper. Mix thoroughly and chill. When beginning to set fold in the celery, apples and beets along with a tablespoon of minced chives, parsley and grated onion. Turn this mixture into individual molds and chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce and serve with mustard mayonnaise dressing.

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Barbecued Ham Slices, Belmont Style
Prepare the sauce as follows: place 2 1/2 tablespoons of butter in small sauce pan with 1/2 cup tomato catsup, 1/2 cup french dressing, 2 teaspoons chili powder, 1/3 cup lemon juice, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 tablespoon drained and ground horseradish, salt to taste. Bring to a boil then cook for two minutes. Now brush one side of ham slices with the sauce. Place on broiler rack about three inches below moderate flame and broil for three minutes. Now brush generously the other side and broil until done.
