Gay Nineties Meat Loaf

- 1 lb. ground round beef
1/2 lb. sausage
1/2 cup milk
1 cup cooked rice
1 chopped onion
3/4 cup chopped green pepper
1 egg slightly beaten
1/4 teaspoon pepper
garlic powder
1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
1/2 teaspoon A-1 sauce
1/3 cup warm water
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 tablespoon kitchen bouquet salt to taste

Mix the ground beef with the sausage, then combine with milk, rice, onion, pepper, seasonings and A-1 sauce. Form into loaf and place into loaf pan. Bake in slow oven (225°) for 1 1/2 hours. Now mix the water with the kitchen bouquet and butter. Use this mixture to baste the loaf occasionally. Excelsior with a tomato gravy. Will make 6 good servings.

Potato Cheese Balls

Prepare two cups of hot mashed potatoes. Beat in 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese and 3/4 cup of scalded thin cream. Season to taste with nutmeg, salt, pepper and a dash of cayenne. While the potatoes are still hot shape into small balls. Roll in mixed fine bread crumbs and grated Parmesan cheese, using equal parts of each. When ready to serve place the balls in a frying basket and place in deep fat (350) 375 F. to brown. Drain on absorbent paper.

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Mrs. Heffner Entertains Amicitia Club

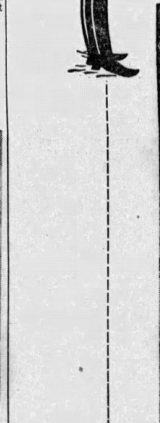
NEWTON - Mrs. Leonard Heffner entertained Friday evening at her home for the meeting of the Amicitia Bridge Club with two additional players invited.

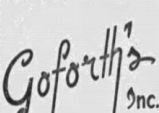
