## U.S. Plan To Halt Reds Gains Ground

CARACAS, Venezuela (U-P)—The United States gained ground today in the 10th Inter-American Conference with its plan to unite action to halt communism in this hemisphere.

Five Latin-American nations—Brazil, the Dominican Republic, Paraguay, Honduras and Nicaragua—threw their support to the new "Dulles Doctrine" in sessions yesterday.

Haiti also called for anti-Red action "not in conflict with the principle of nonintervention."

Underlying the importance of President Eisenhower's government puts on the issue, Dulles canceled a speaking engagement in Philadelphia tomorrow to continue his personal watch on the progress of his anti-Communist resolution. Discussion of it in the Political-Judicial Committee was expected to take several more days.

The U. S. resolution would call for the 21 American republics to consult and act jointly against Communist seizure of power in any of the American states, as they now are pledged to repel jointly invasion by a foreign aggressor. It would also provide for disclosure of identity, activities and sources of funds of persons spreading Communist propaganda or traveling in the interests of the Red cause.

Mexico submitted an amendment to expand such joint action to all forms of totalitarian intervention in the Americas.

Launching the committee debate yesterday, Dulles answered Guatemala's demand that he define international communism. He described it as "that far-flung clandestine political organization which is operated by the leaders of the Communist party of the Soviet Union." He said one of its aims was to bring parts of the Western Hemisphere into its grip.

CHARGE—Brazilian Foreign Minister Vitorino Raul said he would prefer to speak of "Soviet interventionism."

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# Senator Blasts McCarthy in Speech

## MISSING BOY FOUND STUCK IN CHIMNEY

CHICAGO (U-P)—A 6-year-old boy, missing for nearly 6 hours and hunted by more than 150 persons, was found last night stuck in the chimney of an outdoor fireplace 30 feet from his home.

The boy, Robert Unger, had been stuck in the 8-foot high, foot wide chimney for an estimated 3-12 hours. He was taken from his home near suburban Deerfield to a Highland Park hospital suffering from exposure, shock and bruising.

Temperatures were a little above freezing during the time Robert was trapped in the chimney. The boy's mother, Mrs. James Unger, said he had left home about 4 p.m. to play with a neighbor boy. However, while playing in his own back yard Robert apparently had dropped feet first into the chimney.

More than 150 volunteers, including 50 sailors from Great Lakes Naval Training Center and firemen and policemen from several north suburban towns, joined in the search over a two square mile area, most of it heavily wooded.

## Phone Threat Made Against McCarthy

NEW YORK (U-P)—An anonymous McCarthy had been informed of telephone caller, who reportedly spoke with a Spanish accent, told Edward Lawless, night manager of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, security guards early today that "something terrible" would happen to McCarthy (R-Wis) during the night.

McCarthy had checked into the hotel last night. The threat was reported to police. A city patrolman was sent to the hotel and joined a Waldorf-Astoria security guard in an all-night vigil outside McCarthy's room.

Police Lt. Joseph Whelan said McCarthy had been informed of the threat. McCarthy, who arrived here from Miami by plane with his wife Edith, last night, planned to meet today with a permanent subcommittee on investigations.

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## Flanders Says 'McCarthyism' Menaces Party

Ridicules Wisconsin Man's Activities

WASHINGTON (U-P)—Sen. Flanders (R-Wis) said in the Senate today that Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) "is doing his best to shatter" the Republican Party "by intention or through ignorance."

He said McCarthy belongs to a "one-man party, (whose) name is McCarthyism, a title which he has proudly accepted."

McCarthy's search for internal subversion is diverting the nation from external troubles to an "extent dangerous to our future as a nation," Flanders told his colleagues, adding:

"The dangerous attack is from without, not from within. Look out, Senators, and see what is creeping upon us."

Flanders said the world appears to be arming for "age-long warfare between God and the devil," split into Communist and non-Communist camps and asked:

"In this battle . . . what is the part of the Junior Senator from Wisconsin?"

"He dons his war-paint. He goes into his war-shed. He goes forth to battle and proudly returns with the scalp of a pink Army dentist."

The question arose in the wake of a public row between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) and Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens.

McCarthy was not in the Senate chamber. He is in New York today.

Flanders noted McCarthy's absence and said he wished McCarthy were here.

Though McCarthy's activities have been a "running" of controversy within his party, it was one of the first instances in the Senate that a Republican has spoken out so strongly against "McCarthyism."

Flanders, who calls himself a "liberal," said McCarthy's "one-man party" is "a hidden satellite of the Democratic Party to which he is furnishing so much material for quiet mirth. It does not seem that he is very bright, when by intention or through ignorance he is doing his best to shatter that party whose label he wears. He no longer claims or wants any support from the Communist fringe. What is his party affiliation?"

Flanders said he found "much to praise and much to deplore in McCarthyism." The praise-worthy part, he said, "is the vigorous and effective house cleaning which it displays."
