Attorney General
Outlines Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Brownell says the FBI, the Justice Department and the courts are ever vigilant but the nation needs more stringent laws to dig the Communist out of hiding.

Brownell did not mention by name Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), whose Senate Investigations subcommittee had done much of Congress' Red probing. But the attorney general left the strong impression in a national television speech last night, that he believes the law enforcement agencies of the executive branch and the courts are capable of dealing with the Red menace at home.

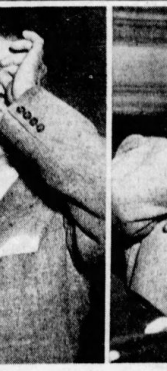
And he said the operation of a law already on the books might, in effect, result in outlawing the Communist party through its own acts.

His speech was regarded in some quarters as an effort to take the heat off from McCarthy's controversial Communist-in-government hunt. Brownell said: "The FBI, the Department of Justice and the courts are your agents in dealing with this Communist conspiracy. All are diligent in their readiness to meet any move or emergency which the Communist party in America might make."

He said new laws are needed, however, "to destroy by legal, orderly processes the Communist party in this country."

The attorney general said the country needs laws "to eliminate Communist control of any industrial organization or labor union in vital sections of our national economy."

Questioning Insistence May Cause Trouble

McCarthy has declared he will "insist" on the right to cross-examine the Army people with whom he is feuding, and has offered to let their counsel cross-examine him. The dramatic proposal to take such arms discussions out of the public eye, where they have proved only a deadlock of propaganda, was made yesterday by Britain's Sir Pierson Dixon before the U. N. Disarmament Commission.

Pre-McCarthy Commie Hunt Action Told

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said today the Americans for Democratic Action fought communism in America "long before" Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and "before it became fashionable for a lot of politicians to do so."

"Long before a junior senator from Wisconsin found his way in Wheeling, W. Va., we have inflicted great and decisive defeats on the Communists in the U.S.A.," Humphrey told the ADA's National Convention.
